We are told that parts of Church Road outside the school are to be resurfaced, as are the parts of Hyde Lane that were missed last time. What a start!

Our County Councillor is allocated some money to spend at his discretion under what is known as the Highways Local scheme. He is looking at the potential to use this funding to install speed humps on Malmesbury Road Trading Estate to make the area unattractive to cruisers/boy racers (at least to those that want to thrash their cars up and down).

I told you last time that we were organising a litter pick as a collaboration between Spirax Sarco and local folk. Well, we assembled a collection of over twenty people and a more decent, positive-minded group you could not wish to meet. A big thank you to the Spirax Sarco staff and the locals who made the effort and to Janice from the Borough Council who brought the equipment plus her infectious energy and enthusiasm. We all came away thinking we had enjoyed ourselves!

We also have in mind doing a bit of clearance work at the south end of the park by the brook. By knocking back some of the undergrowth and putting down bark chippings we could increase the utility of the area and make it a safe, exciting, natural space to explore for young and old.

Speaking of decent, positive-minded folk, we have a new Parish Councillor! I knew I would wear someone down eventually. We have welcomed Yvonne Pirso to the team. Ironically, Yvonne lives just outside the parish boundary but as her home is within three miles of it she qualifies. No-one is safe! Being outside the boundary, Yvonne does not receive the Village News and would have been unaware of my constant whining about apathy, so I can claim no credit for her recruitment. Yvonne has strong, long term links with the parish through the Scouts and the school. She is committed to the well-being of the area, and we look forward to the contribution she will make in the future.

Swindon Village Winemakers

At the April meeting we had a speaker, Mr Alan Pilbeam, who gave us an interesting talk on Medieval Vineyards around Gloucestershire.

The May meeting was our annual B.B.Q where we invite members from clubs in Gloucester, Stroud, Charlton Kings, Glevum, Newent, Cheltenham and The Reddings. There was also a wine competition being judged by Stewart Wilsden. The Peach wine was won by Mark Smith and the Social Kit wine was won by Roy Harper, second was Mike Attwood and third was Mark Smith.

Our talk in May was about the start of air fighting in the First World War. Nigel Thompson told us how aviation was still in its infancy at the start of the war but steadily grew in ability and utility until it was a major force by the war's end. To start with, the main use of aircraft was reconnaissance or spotting for the guns. However, since both these tasks greatly improved the effectiveness of ground forces, efforts were soon made to remove the threat by shooting down the spotters. A great step forward was made when the Germans developed a mechanism that allowed pilots to shoot through their propellers so that they could aim their whole aircraft at the enemy. This was the start of air to air combat.

Nigel then concentrated on two great proponents of this new skill – Mick Mannock and the rather more famous Manfred von Richthofen. Both were excellent pilots and fighters though both were killed in the end. There really was a degree of chivalry present in these fights although the result was still charred bodies and grieving mothers.

Swindon Village had its own participant in this affray. Our Rector at the time was the Reverend Arthur Gabell. His sixth son, Douglas Ridley Clunes Gabell, went straight from Cheltenham College to Sandhurst in 1916 and then joined the Gloucestershire Regiment with a regular commission. However, in September of 1916 he was seconded to the Royal Flying Corps and trained as a pilot. Soon he was flying BE2cs on the Western Front in the reconnaissance and artillery spotting roles. The BE2c was an old aircraft very much outclassed by that time. In March 1917 he was shot down after having been engaged in combat with six enemy aircraft. He was badly injured and sent home. When he had recovered he was posted to 13 Training Squadron, Yatesbury, as an instructor and later Flying Wing Examiner. On 12 July 1918 he was killed with Lt Delmar-Williamson while test flying an RE 8. It seems that the aircraft might have suffered a structural failure. He was buried at St Lawrence's Church, Swindon Village together with his father and one brother. His name appears on our war memorial as well as Cheltenham's war memorial. He is listed as Captain DRC Gabell RAF. This is because the RAF was formed on 1 April 1918 from an amalgamation of the Royal Flying Corps and the Royal Naval Air Service. He was therefore a founder member of this new service but because the amalgamation was done in something of a rush the new blue RAF uniforms were not immediately available and so members kept their old army rank until such date as they were. Had the

right uniform been available Captain Gabell would, in fact, have been Flight Lieutenant Gabell. He was 20 years old. The grave is at the rear of the church near the southern boundary.

'The Hugely Huggable History of the Teddy Bear' was the title of Gillian White's talk at our June meeting. This was a replacement for 'Ice Cream' as our original speaker was unavailable. We were told that there were various stories as to the origin of the toy bear. In Germany the Steiff family produced some for the 1903 Leipzig Toy Fair and received orders for 3,000. In 1904 the Ideal Novelty & Toy Company of the USA produced bears called Theodore, named after President Roosevelt who refused to shoot a bear, hence the 'Teddy' Bear. In Britain in 1905 William Terry started making toy bears, including 4" high ones for the troops of the Great War to keep in their pocket. Chad Valley went into production in 1915 and Merrythought are still producing teddy bears today. In the 1930s and 40s Sylvia Pankhurst introduced equal rights and flexi-hours for the women working at her Ealontoys factory in London. 'Rupert Bear' appeared in the Daily Express in 1920, 'Winnie-the-Pooh' and 'The Teddy Bears' Picnic' followed. TV introduced Andy Pandy's friend 'Teddy' and Harry Corbett's 'Sooty'. 'Paddington', 'Aloysius' of Brideshead and John Betjeman's 'Archie' are amongst the more recent additions, all much loved by young and old! My own much loved, but rejuvenated, Fred Bear (circa 1910), sits on the shelf as he is very delicate these days.

Five members went to the National Annual Meeting in Cardiff. The guest speakers were Dame Stella Rimington, retired head of MI5, and Huw Edwards from the BBC. Both very inspiring speakers, Stella Rimington being the first woman in the post and also the first head of the department to be publicly named. The resolution on mental health was passed with a total vote of over 98%.

With our banner flying we joined in the celebratory march for the Suffragettes from Hyde Park to Westminster. On a hot sunny day, together with thousands of others, and wearing coloured scarves, we created a ribbon of green, white and purple (we had white scarves) through the streets of London; an exhausting but memorable day!

We do not have a regular meeting in August, and so are planning a visit to the Three Choirs Winery and then lunch and retail therapy at the Three Shires Garden Centre. Bats in Swindon Village


At dusk recently, Matthew and I took a walk around the village with a bat detector.

This year's was one of our most successful - as you can see from the selection of pictures how good we are all getting!





