Since my last article coronavirus has swept (and changed) the world. The Parish Council is actively considering how best to support the vulnerable members of our community. If you know of someone who needs a helping hand let us know. If you are able to offer support to others, however that may be, let us know. This is a special Village News with information about what to do, how to help and how to ask for help. Who knows, perhaps it will become a collectors' item when, in happier times, we are looking back on the events of today. The Parish Council will also put information on our noticeboards (at Wymans Lane/Swindon Lane bus stop, Quat Goose Lane bus stop, the church and outside the Cross Hands) and offer a phone number for people to call. These are unprecedented times. The Parish Council intends to do what it can but it is up to every one of us. Let's show that we are a community that takes care of each other.

The virus is moving faster than the legislators. To conduct their business the law requires that Parish Councils must meet in person and be open to the public. In the present circumstances this goes against government advice. Consideration is being given to empowering local government to continue under the new, restrictive regime.

By the time you read this you will know that the litter pick that I had planned for the 25th has had to be cancelled. Keep Britain Tidy, like many organisations, has postponed its activities for the foreseeable future.

On to happier matters. The bench is now installed in the Amenity Area and, if the weather improves and we are allowed to leave our homes, may be enjoyed by all. There are many activities that are now impossible (or at least not recommended). Walking in the fresh air is something we can all continue to enjoy.

We are all used to complaining about councils and utility companies. I must say I have recently had a very positive experience with Severn Trent. I reported the poor condition of three stopcock covers at the entrance to Morris Hill Close. One was missing altogether. I received a text the following day to say that repairs had been completed.

The horse trough has been looking magnificent and spring-like despite the appalling weather. Back in summer 2018 I was corresponding with Neil

suggesting that, in view of the dry conditions, we could set up a rota of councillors to keep the trough watered. No problems with it drying out so far this year! Thank you and well done to Neil!

I have mentioned again (and again) that we are short of councillors. We should have nine but we only have four. This came to a head when we were scheduled to meet in March. With one councillor ill and another away with work we didn't have the three members required for a quorum. As a result we couldn't conduct any business. If this continues, planning applications will sail through without our input. This might make the developers happy but will not be such good news for the local scene.

As everything closes down for the duration there will probably be less and less to report. Please keep an eye on the website and the noticeboards. Also, keep an eye on your neighbours. Stay safe and well and help to ensure that the vulnerable members of our community do the same.

As I am sure many of you are aware, the Church of England has taken radical and rightful measures during this time of the Coronavirus Pandemic to safeguard its people by suspending all acts of public worship aside from Weddings, Funerals and Baptisms. It is a move which is in keeping with the rest of society at this time, as we, as a nation, aim to stem the spread of this virus.

If you are reading this before Mothering Sunday, when there will no public services, the Archbishops are encouraging a National Day of Prayer. Please light a Candle at 7pm on Sunday and put it in your window. Please do call somebody who is isolated and vulnerable if you are able and stay in touch with one another. As the Archbishops have highlighted, we are to be “a radically different Church during this time”; perhaps it will be a reminder of our roots as Christians as we take a more bare-bones approach to being the people of God, albeit having to be that with a physical distance between each other.

i'm Dancing 'cause
Your Love has set me Free



The hit BBC series, REV. charts the ups and downs of being a parish priest. It's a fairly accurate portrayal of ministerial life and it really is very funny. The main character, Rev Adam Smallbone, resides in the London borough of Hackney. He is the priest in charge of St Saviour's. As like any parish, it has its challenges and Rev Adam, for the most part, meets those challenges head-on. There is a constant comedic slant to his encounters with the world, but rather than belittle the roles of both clergy and

parishioner, the programme generally highlights, through the use of comedy, the things that should be obvious to us but are at times obscured from view.

In a section of the novel inspired by the series, it's Holy Saturday and Rev Adam is preparing to begin the Easter Vigil at midnight. He notes that it is the biggest crowd that he can remember gathered outside the church in front of the brazier and he is absolutely elated. Though initially impressed with the number, he is forced to acknowledge that the hundreds contain both "true believer and passing clubber alike" (*as if the two are mutually exclusive tut! tut!*). The passing clubbers, attracted by the controlled fire, lose interest when the rest of the service leads everyone else into the church.

Maybe by the time this is read, Holy Saturday will have come and gone for us. But we understand that, at whatever time this is read, we live in a constant and all encompassing resurrection light that attracts, exists beyond time, does not discriminate and speaks to us on one level or another; and even yet, if we choose to, we can pass the whole experience by.

At the start of the Vigil we symbolically take something of God into those hard to reach corners of the world, and we proclaim that this is for you too; this is for all – 'true believer and clubber alike'. It's an important message and it testifies to the resurrection as a saving act that cannot, of itself, be influenced but relies solely upon God's grace – this is what makes it such an amazing accomplishment; one which draws us all together in perfect union under God, so that on the last day, we, righteous and unrighteous, may rejoice as we rise with him in glory.

A very Happy Easter to you all.....true believer and clubber alike.

Peter Berry came along to talk to us all at our meeting in March and he brought fabulous slides of his trip to Sub Zero China by Train with him. It was honestly an eye opener as to how other nations live. He flew in to Beijing and stayed there for a couple of days before going to Inner Mongolia.

They have two seasons a year, winter and summer. Winter is 30 – 40 degrees below freezing and summer is 30 – 40 degrees above. His pictures were amazing, the mountains and hills covered in frozen ice and snow but the Mongolian people were just in light jackets but always wearing a hat. Peter and his friends by contrast were wearing thermal underwear, thick shirts and jumpers and usually three coats with scarves, gloves and hats.

Toilet facilities were a huge concern because outside of the cities they were just a hole in the ground. They were all told to take their own plug for the sinks as they did not have them over there. However, when the plugs were pulled out, water cascaded down onto their feet - no plumbing!

It was a really enjoyable evening with supper provided by Elaine and Margaret and it would be lovely to see Peter again sometime soon.

I do believe that this report is going to be a bit thin. Our March meeting has now been cancelled so it will be some time before we find out just what the Gloucester Regiment got up to at Waterloo (the battle, not the station). My talks are all being cancelled at present as part of the great social shut-down. When shall we meet again?

So what can I do to fill up a little space? Well, I will start with a nature note. On Sunday I was in our porch and looked up to see a red legged partridge strolling down the path. It ambled to the back garden and Sarah and I shot to the kitchen windows to see it looking around bemusedly as though it too had no idea how it had got there. Finally it ambled off through next door's garden aiming for the lake. I have never seen a red legged partridge anywhere near the village so I was surprised. Do let me know if they are common in back gardens.

The same day I had a newt in the cellar. Since this is a brick built cellar with double walls all round I would dearly love to know how it got in there. Likewise the frogs that appear from time to time although I always imagine that they arrive as tiny tadpoles through the ground water that runs through in heavy rain. They are put out into the back garden for the heron to eat.

Now for a geology note. The reason my cellar floods is that underneath the main part of the village there is a saucer of impermeable clay that was scooped out as the waters flooded south at the end of the last ice age. On top of this is a mound of sand. The Church stands on the highest point. Swindon Hall is very close to the eastern rim of the clay saucer. The cellar below extends into the sand. When it rains a lot the rain drains through the sand but can't easily get out of the clay saucer so builds up. Some of it comes into my cellar, flows through as a small stream and disappears into a small drain hole and sets off down a drain made about two hundred and fifty years ago that passes through the edge of the clay towards the playing field. Sometimes the drain gets overwhelmed and the cellar floods. This is why three Christmases ago I had to put wellington boots on every time we needed a bottle of wine. In 2007 there was two foot of water in the cellar and some very surprised frogs who had to learn to swim very quickly. Oddly enough it has not flooded this year through the downpours. I thought you would all be very interested in that exposition – stop yawning at the back.

It is because of this mound of sand or small hill that we are known as Swindon. It comes from the Saxon - Suindone. Suin – swine – pigs. Done

– hill. So we are the hill where the pigs are kept. So we should be called Pigshill. And the Village bit comes from the time that we had a railway halt of our own, for a few years around 1850 and they called us Swindon Village on the time table to distinguish us from Swindon Town down south. Now if this comes up in a quiz don't put money on it but I am pretty sure it is true. So there we are, all none the wiser but possibly slightly better informed and I have filled up the space.
