

### **SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT**

A number of you seemed to enjoy last month's article on the Tesco train. Thank you for your feedback- it is always appreciated. It's funny though, I tell you about the finer points of planning law and get no feedback at all, yet you get excited about a train? What a strange lot you are. Seriously, I have a deal for you. I am going to start with planning this month and, if you promise to read it, I'll tell you about another train next month.

On a number of occasions I have mentioned the Cheltenham Local Plan and hoped that it would be for the last time. Like the Joint Core Strategy it has refused to lie down, but I think we can now put it to bed. In the expectation that I won't need to talk about it again, I will summarise what it is and what has gone on.

The Cheltenham Local Plan sets out a planning policy for the Cheltenham Borough until 2031, when a new Plan will be needed. Initially, proposals were put to the Borough Council and consultations took place with interested parties including parish councils, community groups, etc. A Draft Plan was then prepared that had to be in accord with the Joint Core Strategy for the wider area (Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Gloucester). Once the Borough Council was happy with the Draft Plan it was submitted to an examination by a government-nominated Planning Inspector.

The Inspector had to hear evidence from all the stakeholders and recommended changes to the Plan. The changes had to be considered by the Borough Council. Eventually a Plan was arrived at which could be signed off by both the Planning Inspector and the Borough Council. At every turn we had to fight our corner to try to protect the Green Belt and retain some Local Green Space.

Finally, the Plan went to the Secretary of State. Even at the eleventh hour the Plan was challenged by a developer wishing to see the area of Local Green Space significantly reduced in size.

I can now report that the challenge to the Cheltenham Local Plan has failed. As the Local Green Space around the north of Swindon Village is enshrined in the plan that should mean it is protected for the foreseeable future. It may be the most significant area of Local Green Space in the country. This is the culmination of a tremendous amount of hard work by a small number of dedicated people principally from Save the Countryside, the Parish Council and the Borough Council.

Persimmon Homes had submitted plans for the first part of the Elms Park development. Elms Park received outline approval and could see over 4000 homes built in the area. The first phase of this is the application for full planning permission for 260 homes on the Swindon Farm land. You may have noticed that Swindon Farm itself is already being demolished in preparation for the development. Following objections from the Parish Council and others, the plans have been completely revised and resubmitted. At the time of writing our Parish Councillors are reviewing the new plans. A major concern is that it is unclear how the overall infrastructure needs of the area (medical practices, sports facilities, shops, etc.) will be met. The first tranche of the development fails to provide any of these facilities. We think it is inadequate for the developer simply to say that the overall scheme will make provision. The site will be built out in increments and there should be a credible plan that shows how and when these facilities will be provided.

There is a footpath across the fields from Dog Bark Lane to the Gallagher Retail Park. The developer was seeking to divert this footpath but the application has been withdrawn. The footpath will now continue to follow its existing route.

The photograph shows the view from the footpath looking back towards Dog Bark Lane with Spirax Sarco visible on the right. Once the development is complete this will be a view down the road of a housing estate



The other end of the footpath joins a track that runs to the side of Next and into Gallagher Retail Park. This track has been overgrown and strewn with rubbish. The trees and bushes have now been cut back and the Parish Council is looking to get the fly tipping and general rubbish cleared.

Speaking of Dog Bark Lane, you will recall that the gates were stolen from the junction of Dog Bark Lane and Manor Road. They were quite distinctive, the smaller one being a bridleway gate designed to be operated by a mounted horse rider. Thanks to an eagle eyed walker they were spotted! They were leaning against a hedge in a field half way between Swindon Village and Elmstone Hardwick. The County Council will be recovering them and re-hanging them. The motive behind the theft remains a mystery.

Another footpath initiative the Parish Council is exploring concerns the frontage of the gym on Wymans Lane. At the moment people struggle up and down a muddy section of rough ground. The grass verge is owned by the County Council and we are negotiating with them in an attempt to see a proper footpath put in place.



I have been in touch with the developer of the former Vibixa site. Their plans have been adversely affected by the Covid pandemic. The latest news is that the contract for the construction of the industrial units has been awarded to local company Barnwood. It is due to start work on 19<sup>th</sup> April. The project is now scheduled to complete by 31<sup>st</sup> January 2022.

The telecommunications equipment on the corner of Runnings Road and Kingsditch Lane is being upgraded to 5G. I queried why the old mast was still in situ. Apparently the new 5G mast is not yet in service but when it is the old mast and some of the associated boxes should be removed.

The Parish Council has commissioned a report on the condition of the war memorial in the churchyard. We are concerned that some of the lettering has become difficult to read. A stone conservator has examined the monument. He will submit a condition report and recommend remedial work. In planning matters we generally deal with Cheltenham Borough Council, but the Borough Council has no jurisdiction on church property. We will share the report with the church and the diocese and agree a way forward

The Parish Council has accepted a quote for repainting our two wooden bus shelters (one in Wymans Lane and one in Quat Goose Lane).

I continue to recommend the website fixmystreet.com for reporting fly tipping, potholes and other issues to the appropriate authority. A creative individual recently reported a pothole and cited the meteorite that landed in the vicinity of Winchcombe as the probable cause. I'm not sure whether this drew a higher priority response but it was worth a try.

### **MARK AT WORK**

Post-Easter Sunday has always been a very reflective time for me. For some reason it feels as though I can take deeper breaths basking in the joy of the resurrection. Of course, we know that the story does not end here, but it feels as though there exists a 'clearing' in this wonderful moment that makes things that bit more lucid and visible.

On 25<sup>th</sup> April, we celebrate St Mark the Evangelist. I thought about Mark for this month in relation to that feeling I have just described. I happened across the word, *'Ephphatha'* in Mark 7: 31-37 and in doing so I realised that it was a word and story that best captured what I was feeling.

If you remember, the story is about the healing of the deaf-mute. Ephphatha is a Greek word from the Aramaic, which means, 'to be opened'. It was the word that Jesus used to heal this man from his disability. It is a story which contains many actions that demonstrate that sense of 'release'; from Jesus' own deep groan while looking up to heaven, to the man's own sense of being made free once Jesus touched his tongue and removed his fingers from his ears.

From that moment, the deaf-mute would experience life in a very different way, dare I say it, perhaps in a more lucid way. He had experienced his own 'clearing', and maybe it can be said that he was a witness to the meaning of the resurrection before it had even happened in reality. Jesus had set this man free from his own unique knowledge of bondage, as an example of all the bondages with which Jesus' sacrificial life was to address.

Maybe, as a result of reliving the story of the resurrection, we feel that 'Ephphatha' moment as a form of release. We become more open to understanding what has been won for us.

I pray that as we enjoy these days of Spring, we can once again allow ourselves to be opened up and transformed into the people that God would have us really be, and to the life with which he would have us enjoy.

In the last edition, there was a list of the 26 parks I had found around Cheltenham. Since then I have found three more. One is Prestbury Park and playing fields. I had looked at it and thought it not worth mentioning but since then I have revisited. I have now found that if you walk across the playing field from Prestbury Road towards the new development on the south side of New Barn Lane you come to a large open area with a play area including a zip wire. There is also a stream running through and a flood catchment. There are other open areas in the estate. Then the day before this second visit, a small refreshments hut had opened up in the playing field area- so I now award the place two stars.

Next, I found that under Pilley Bridge there is a small nature reserve that you can walk through. It has a stream that comes from a spring and then disappears down a culvert. Perfect for small persons with gum boots, so two stars. If you come out at the western end you are close to Naunton Park which has a coffee bar. The area is part of the old rail line to Banbury and there is quite a good mural under the bridge and a short stretch of railway line.

Finally I found Burrows sports field not far from Pilley. That too has a coffee hut and quite a few interesting paths to and from it. It has a child's play area, but it also has a lumpy bumpy cycling track with banked corners, which is going to get my grand-daughters over excited when they finally get to visit; so another two stars.

Well, that makes twenty nine parks but everyone (me) likes a round figure so I am going to add the Fiddlers Green open space off Springbank Road. It is small, but does have a play area and two interesting grassed mounds. So I have been down into the cellar, rummaged around and found one small, rather dusty star I can give the area so that we have thirty parks. I will keep looking.

I have to say that the town is exceptionally well served with such areas. No one (me) likes to give CBC credit but the state of most of the parks is excellent.

I know of no play area anywhere better than the one in Pittville. But the greatest surprise of all was my reassessment of Fiddlers Green Park. Having not been there for many years and remembering it as nothing special, I thought the trees excellent, the kids play area good and the art work – The Listening Stones - really outstanding. The only thing missing was coffee but I imagine that you can find one in Coronation Square which is five minutes away.

Now to market gardens. These were very important to the village for many years. There were many such gardens in the Kingsditch area. Eileen Allen and Sally Self of the Cheltenham LHS have put together an article which describes many of them. This will be published in the next edition of the CLHS bulletin. If anyone would like a copy please contact Eileen at emallen@blueyonder.co.uk. The bulletin will cost £2 and I can promise it will make an interesting read.

We would also encourage people to look at the revised planning permission for the area around Swindon Farm where they are planning to build three storey houses. There is some information on the Swindon Community Facebook page where you can add your own comments. However, if you want your opinions to really count, you should be prepared to put your opinions to the Cheltenham Borough Council.

Finally two repeats from last month's article because we had some success here. The Society has produced seven volumes of village history. These are still available. Barry Simon and Eileen Allen are happy to provide them to anyone who is interested. If you have a particular interest and want to know if it features at all in any of the volumes just e-mail Barry as above and we will let you know. Prices for the volumes vary in the region £5 to £8.

I also have one or two copies of the 'Teddies in Lockdown' book which has over fifty pictures of Teddy Bears getting through the last year. It is very well put together and will make even adults smile. I have a few copies for sale at £8 which goes to the Deaf Society.
