#### **SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT**

The willow tree that had fallen next to the bridge on Manor Road has to be felled. I am told it is likely to grow again, and quite rapidly. The elm next to it will be reduced in height in the interest of safety and to allow the work on the willow to proceed. I was quite pleased to find out that it is a healthy elm. However, the bad news is that, although it may take a while, its fate is sealed. It will succumb to Dutch Elm Disease as it matures.



We will also be dealing with the two chestnuts on the path through the Amenity Area and also the trees near the back fences of the houses in Manor Court.

Also on trees, concern was expressed that the trees planted by the County Council in grass verges in Swindon Village would obstruct the view of vehicle drivers. Councillors have taken a look at the trees and are of the opinion that they won't impede visibility.

The large cedar tree in the park shed a major limb recently. Sadly, this is another tree that is dying and will be lost. Working on the tree must have given this tree surgeon a magnificent view!

Do any of you remember the Summer of Love? If you are reading this you probably do! Well, this summer has been dubbed the Summer of Resurfacing by Gloucestershire County Council. Catchy.

More than 170 miles of the County's roads are being resurfaced. GCC have also invested in a jet patcher machine that can fix 100 potholes a day. Let's hope we see it in our area! Eight new teams are finding and fixing smaller potholes in a single visit before they become bigger problems.

The resurfacing combined with the installation of fibre optic services has made getting around the area by car hugely frustrating. Walking and cycling, as well as being good for the planet, seem to be the only option!

For those of you below pension age the Summer of Love was 1967 by the way. See if it comes up in the quiz.

The litter pick scheduled for 30th July was postponed. Quite a few of the "regulars" are parish councillors. With a number of people away the decision was taken to postpone the event to the 6th August. This was publicised on the website and on Facebook but I know some of you do not use these lines of communication. Apologies if you went along only to be disappointed. The next litter pick is on 3rd September starting at the Village Hall at 10:30am but please check the website, Facebook or your councillors if there may be late changes due to the weather, etc.

A number of residents, particularly those who are elderly or infirm, have asked whether there are folk available to perform small household jobs for payment. The Parish Council cannot directly facilitate this but there is clearly a market for this kind of service. If anyone is interested in performing this work can I urge you to take out a small advertisement in the Village News? It is cost effective and puts your service in front of all the residents in the parish.

They can offer (for example) consumer advice from "Which?", phone numbers and addresses for any business/authority in the UK and abroad, local information including groups, societies, education and local business details. They can even help with tracing family history. And it's FREE.



You may be aware that the Cirencester Road out of Cheltenham has been closed for a while. I noticed that at the junction of London Road and Hales Road a diversion suggested that vehicles turn right. On the traffic lights was a "no right turn" sign! The contradiction had gone unnoticed despite the production of formal documents and drawings. The signs were changed immediately. People power!

Sadly we have another instance of graffiti on our bench in the Amenity Area. If anyone knows who is responsible please contact the police.

Not content with doing renovation work on the sundial mosaic itself Barry has now restored the sign which explains how the sundial should be used. Fantastic effort!

#### A Way of Taking Control!

One of the daily challenges vicars face is making the Christian faith relevant to people's daily lives. And, of course, not being too 'other worldly' themselves!

This month, I offer a way of dealing with the more unpleasant, niggly parts of life. As with many things, this is an ancient solution that goes back to the beginnings of the Christian Church. It comes from a modern-day mystic, called Richard Rohr and this, in summary, is how it goes.

It does seem that people's tempers are getting shorter. While running through our town, the number of rage issues at roundabouts and road junctions seems on the increase. Do you notice more people driving too close to your rear bumper these days? Heaven forbid if you stall at the traffic lights – little mercy is shown!


Next time a resentment, negativity, or irritation comes into your mind, and you know you have to deal with it, move that thought or the person concerned literally into your heart space down in your chest because such things are almost entirely lodged in your head. One there in your chest, your heart space, surround it with silence which is always much easier to do in

the heart; our heads are rather visible! There, it is surrounded with blood, which will often feel warm like coals from a fire. In this place, it is almost impossible to comment, judge, or remain revengeful, angry, or antagonistic. You are in a place that does not create or feed on mental disagreements or argument but is within the natural organ of life, embodiment, and love. Love lives and thrives in the heart space. I know doing this has kept me from wanting to hurt people who have hurt me. It keeps me every day from obsessive, or

compulsive head games, from re-running pointless disputes or rows which can otherwise plague my sleeping hours. In short, it can make the difference between being happy and being miserable and negative.

How can you start doing this? Why not pray for someone you care about as a first step. When we are praying for someone, we are holding them in our heart space, safe and secure in our chest. Think of that person next to your pumping heart! Move them there in an almost physical sense, and you will see how calmly and quickly this works.


#### Home collection boxes

## Go grow with Dale

Hello fellow villagers, my name's Dale Goodwin and I've lived in the Village most of the past 20 years. Two and a half years ago now, my Wife and I purchased our first ever house in St Lawrence Court behind the Church.

The garden was very much a blank canvas of uneven, sloping, mostly clay soil, but we've spent a lot of time transforming it into a space that we and our 20-Month-old son love. We both love gardening, in particular I am very much into 'Grow Your Own'. This year I'm growing Onions, Carrots, Potatoes, Tomatoes, Courgettes, Spring Onions, Strawberries, Green Beans, Brussel Sprouts, Swede, Cauliflower, Lettuce, Various Herbs and even attempting Watermelons!

Make no mistake though, it's not just fruit and veg we love, we have a huge range of flowers and shrubs and have made our garden as ecofriendly and low maintenance as possible, with things such as 'Lazy Mix' (Slow grow) Grass to reduce mowing and planting lots of Nasturtiums to keep the aphids/caterpillars off other plants, instead of using bug spray etc. We generally only buy hardy perennials too after the incredible temperature difference of Summer to Winter 2022 (41C to -14C).

I hope to share tips on aforementioned plants in future Village News issues and thank you to Karren for letting me get involved!

July saw us off on a perfect evening to visit Westaway on the side of Cleeve Hill. I enjoy these garden visits because they often give me reason to be pleased that we have a small easy care garden. Westaway is not such a garden. It is one and a half acres of slope. As the NGS brochure so aptly puts it, you are introduced to the challenges of gardening on a gradient. However, even I can see the rewards of having half a dozen different gardens together, with everything from a bog garden to herbaceous borders and all with a fantastic view out over the Severn Vale. However I can also see the drawbacks of having to mow an acre of grass at twenty degrees. I too would have gone for Ian and Elizabeth's solution of putting half of it to wildflower. Finishing it all off with tea and buns while gazing out to the distant Malvern Hills made it an evening to remember.

Now on to July. It is always difficult reviewing your own talk. Let us just say it was OK. Finding it difficult to get a speaker in the holiday season I rootled around in my own back catalogue and came across 'The History of Brockhampton' that I put together in 2004. Realising that, since I only just remember giving the talk, the chance of anyone else remembering it were slight and so I went ahead with it. And I have to say I found it quite interesting. For instance, the reason Magdalen Farmhouse has that name is that 70 acres of the land around Brockhampton was owned by the Oxford College of that name in the late 15th century and they did not sell it off until 1874. Of course the talk did cover rather more than the strict history of the hamlet, with quite a lot about Southam and Bishops Cleeve. Indeed, I now remember that one of the things that prompted me to put the talk together in the first place was the discovery in the Gloucester Records Office of a book which reprinted

lots of old Anglo-Saxon charters and documents and then translated them into something I could understand on the oppositepage. One of these related to the boundary of Bishops Cleeve as it was in 768. And of course their southern boundary then was also Swindon's northern boundary. And over the large number of years between now and then little has changed. Much of the boundary runs along what was then called South Tirle Brooks which is now Hyde Brook, the stream just this side of Brockhamton.

However the best thing about the talk is that we had about 25 visitors from Brockhampton who not only contributed a small entrance fee but many of whom stayed for a chat afterwards.

And so it is on to September when Dr Tim Brain will tell us about the battle of Imjin River and when many of the Gloucester Regiment were captured fighting a heroic rearguard action. Tim, ex Chief Constable, but a real historian is a first rate speaker and unlike our last history speaker has a degree in the subject. I didn't even get an O Level.

Please note that the October talk mentioned on the front cover is not actually about me.

#### The Planning Landscape

#### **Strategic Matters**

Remember I told you endlessly about the Joint Core Strategy (JCS), the overarching planning policy for Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury? Remember the joy you felt when it was approved and I stopped banging on about it? Hold on to your hat...

The JCS covers the period 2011 to 2031 (though it wasn't adopted until late 2017). Work is now starting on its successor.

The new document will be called the Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury Strategic and Local Plan (CGTSLP). Snappy eh? This document will replace the JCS and, in our case, the Cheltenham Local Plan.

The councils of Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury are each producing a Local Development Scheme (LDS) describing how the CGTSLP will be produced and the timescales. There will be a series of public consultations commencing in October 2023. The plan is for the CGTSLP to be submitted to the Secretary of State in April 2026. We must prepare to fight to retain Local Green Space yet again!

#### **Specific Developments**

The outline planning application for Elms Park (Borough Council reference 16/02000/OUT) is unlikely to come before the Borough Council planning committee before October and it is more likely to be towards the end of the year. The overall scheme for Elms Park depends on the M5 Junction 10 expansion being progressed. Parish Councillors James, Alison and Helen have met with the planning officer for Elms Park to discuss various issues.

The planning application for Swindon Farm (Borough Council reference 20/00759/FUL) is part of the wider Elms Park development. The planning application has been approved. The developers are keen to push the development forward even though the overall Elms Park outline application (above) has yet to be approved. The Swindon Farm developers have agreed to give £2.5 million towards the M5 Junction 10 development. Note that this development includes no infrastructure elements (schools, medical and sports facilities, etc.).

The outline planning application for Home Farm (Borough Council reference 23/00354/OUT) continues to cause concern. This is not part of the Elms Park development but is part of the housing allocation within the JCS. In addition to the Parish Council both National Highways and Gloucestershire County Council are unhappy with the proposed traffic arrangements and recommend that consideration of this planning application be deferred.

The development of Manor Farm (Borough Council reference 20/00749/FUL) has progressed quickly.

#### **Changes to Polling Arrangements**

The next Borough Council elections in Cheltenham are in 2024. Changes are being made to the wards prior to the election. So let's explain parishes and wards.

#### What is a parish?

Note that we are talking about civil parishes here, nothing to do with the church.

A parish is the smallest division of land in local government terms. The Parish Council represents the interests of residents in the parish, and the boundary of a parish may be the same as that of a ward or it may be a part of a ward or split across wards.

#### What is a ward?

A ward is an area represented by one County Councillor on Gloucestershire County Council and by two Borough Councillors on Cheltenham Borough Council.

#### What are the present arrangements?

Our parish is Swindon. It is part of a ward that is called (confusingly) Swindon Village. In addition to the parish, our ward includes part of Prestbury Parish, principally Wymans Brook.

#### What changes are being made?

The area to the south of the parish (south of Tewkesbury Road) is being moved out of the Swindon Village ward and will become part of the Springbank ward. This includes River Leys, Hayden Road, Glynbridge Gardens and Riverview Way.

#### What will be the effect of these changes?

People living in the above roads will no longer have the same Borough and County Councillors as the rest of the Parish. You will no longer vote at Swindon Village Hall but at a polling station closer to you.

#### What will be the effect on the parish?

The boundary of the parish will be unchanged and if you are currently in the parish you will still be in the parish after the changes. However, the parish will be split into two polling districts, north and south. The south district will include the roads mentioned above and the rest of the parish will now be the north district.

#### In summary

Unless you live in River Leys, Hayden Road, Glynbridge Gardens and Riverview Way there will effectively be no change, but see the note on ID below.

If you live in any of those roads you will still belong to the parish but you will vote at a polling station nearer to where you live and you will be represented by different Borough and County Councillors.

From the next elections onwards everyone will need to carry photo ID when they vote.

I thought this would be easy to explain but I am even confusing myself as I write! If you have questions please get in touch with me or any of your Parish or existing Borough or County Councillors and we will try to clarify matters.


