Once again the Joint Core Strategy has hit the news. The opponents of the strategy to build thousands of new homes on green belt land (including the Parish Council) have been arguing that the councils of Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Gloucester have over-estimated the need for housing. The document is supposed to be based on a solid foundation of objective evidence yet very late in the day the JCS team took 800 houses out of the plan (though not from our area). This seems to suggest that the figures used to justify the developments are not entirely reliable. The JCS team are unwilling to wait for the latest population figures from the Office of National Statistics, due shortly. At the time of writing, and following heated debate, the councils of Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Gloucester have approved the plan to go forward to the final stage of consultation before it is put to the government. Cheltenham Borough Council have at least tried to include a stipulation that the latest population figures and the results of recent traffic surveys are considered when they become available.

In a recent previous issue I mentioned Neighbourhood Co-ordination Groups (NCGs). To briefly recap, the meetings involve representatives from the County Council, the Borough Council, the Police and the public. The meetings are intended to give people more direct access to the organisations that provide our services. In our patch it has been decided that it makes sense to combine the function of the NCG into our own Parish Council meetings. The April Parish Council meeting included this extra element. It was organised in a bit of rush and none of us knew quite what to expect. However, we think it was a success as it allowed us to talk directly to people who can get us answers. Writing emails and letters is all well and good but sometimes it is better to sit across the table and discuss issues directly. We are grateful to the representatives of the bodies who attended. As a result the Council's normal business ran late so we still need to do some fine tuning. We agreed that meetings in this form should take place quarterly. Since the NCG-type business is conducted during the public session of the Parish Council meeting everyone is free to contribute. We will give plenty of notice of the next one and anyone coming along will have an opportunity to raise their issues.

The Annual Parish meeting is scheduled to take place on 13th May. We are hoping to use the school hall as in previous years. At the moment we are discussing possible speakers. Please make a note of the date and look out for further announcements via the web site and notice boards.

Every four years an event happens that generates tremendous excitement, and this is one of those special years. There is also a Football World Cup. Yes, I am talking about a Parish Council election. All the current councillors have to put themselves up for re-election if they wish to continue in office and new hats can be thrown into the ring. If anyone is interested in becoming a councillor I would be more than happy to

discuss what is involved. The election will be held on Thursday 22nd May 2014. And the World Cup starts on the 12th June.

The allotment growing season is under way and, now that the floods have subsided, the allotments are a hive of activity. Some of our public spirited folk made a new gate for the allotments; it was then spirited away by a “gentleman” in a blue car. If anyone knows the proud owner of a blue car and a new, hand made gate perhaps they could let me (or the police) know. I should, of course, make it clear that there may be honest people in the area with blue cars and new gates that they have paid good money for.

The Parish Council will soon be having the internal auditor go through our accounts for 2013-2014. The preliminary figures show a deficit of £68.43 on the year against a budgeted surplus of £205.00. Therefore our financial position is £273.43 adverse to where we had hoped to be. However, various works on the Amenity Area and allotments have been completed so overall we are in good shape. It was recently discovered that one parish council (not in Cheltenham) has been having its internal audit signed off by someone who has been dead for three years! We intend to use a real live accountant.

We know it actually was a Spoonbill because there were many groups of serious birders with their telephoto lenses just to see it. And then we even made the church coffee morning in time for a bit of cake. Perfect.

What is In Touch?

In Touch has been running for 12 years. It is a countywide project that is funded by Gloucestershire County Council and managed and delivered by GRCC. It has a vast history of intergenerational work and specialist projects that support older people across the county.

In Touch is a project that supports any **health** or **social** related activity for older people in Gloucestershire. This consists of:

- Maintaining a database of all the clubs in the county
- Keeping clubs informed about news regarding funding, health, social, welfare issues.
- Helping clubs to be sustainable and providing them with advice and support when they need it.
- Setting up new, self-sustainable clubs where there is a need.
- Supporting clubs on the verge of closing to try and keep them open. If they need to close, we will support them in doing this legally.
- Ensuring clubs have all of their governance in place. e.g. Constitution, funding, committee, insurance, finance.
- Hold annual information events across the county relating to issues for older people, their families and carers.
- Working at a strategic level to ensure that voices on the ground are considered in countywide decision making.
- Working in partnership with other organisations to ensure a joined up approach of working and to tackle social isolation and increase wellbeing as much as possible.

How do Village and Community Agents work with In Touch?

- To let In Touch know about any clubs in the county that need some advice and support because they are struggling.
- To help at your local information event.
- To let In Touch know of any new clubs that have emerged.
- To identify gaps where new clubs can be set up and pass on to Katie.
- To promote the project in your day to day work.
- To let In Touch know of any clubs that do not know about In Touch but that could benefit from some information.
- To refer a person who is looking for a club to In Touch.

We currently support 232 clubs across the county but we know there are many more. A club can be anything from a lunch club, to an informal coffee morning, to a scrabble club, to a Tai Chi class.
