Swindon Parish Council

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

Despite the installation of a height limitation barrier in the park the travellers again managed to get in on 30th June. The Borough Council and the police were involved in negotiations with them. The travellers are classed as an ethnic minority and the Borough Council has a duty of care for their welfare whilst they are in their area. The situation and the legal position is complex. The travellers often set up camp on a Thursday or Friday as they know it is impossible to progress an eviction order through the courts on a weekend. As luck would have it the annual church fete was taking place on the Saturday. Thankfully disruption was minimal and the caravans moved on during the course of the Saturday afternoon.

The Borough Council officer with responsibility for dealing with travellers came to the July Parish Council meeting. We discussed what had happened and the roles of the different authorities. Sadly it seems that there is not a single point of contact in dealing with such situations; the police and the Borough Council both need to be notified. At the moment it is difficult to know who has been told and what action is being taken. We are hopeful that a written procedure will be made available to the public in the near future and we (or the Borough Council) will be able to give clear information to the public as to the state of play.

On to planning issues and, as ever, the JCS. The review of the JCS by an independent planning inspector has already been in progress for a considerable time and may run into next year. Some of the parish councillors have attended sessions to help make the case against the massive developments that are proposed. The Local Green Space proposal lead by Cllrs. Arran Stibbe and Helen Wells and supported by so many local people and organisations has proved to be a worthwhile initiative. The planning inspector seems to be fair and objective and will be taking time to look at the Swindon/Uckington/Elmstone Hardwicke area for herself.

One of the major topics yet to be considered is traffic management in the area. As all locals are painfully aware the current traffic flows are busy and chaotic. Additional housing and industrial capacity will only compound the problem. The developers themselves only look at what is required to get traffic into and out of their estates; managing the flows beyond their boundary becomes an issue for Gloucestershire County Council. Opponents of the JCS (including the Parish Council) contend that there is no credible strategic plan in place to deal with the increase in traffic that will result from these developments.

There is little else to report on the planning front. The planning applications that we have reviewed recently have tended to be either domestic extensions or changes of use of premises on the industrial estate. The latter point is interesting and divides opinion. Is it better to see an industrial building turned into a dance studio or does that represent a regrettable loss of light industrial capacity? There are rarely easy

answers, and sometimes some unusual questions. At the moment Spirax Sarco is seeking permission for two flagpoles along Runnings Road. Anyone can submit comments on any applications. Even better, you can join these debates by joining the Parish Council!

The proposed night time closure of the Accident and Emergency facility at Cheltenham General Hospital has caused much concern. Swindon, along with many other local Parish Councils, has added its name to the petition seeking to have this decision reversed.

The BBC generated some excitement when "DIY SOS: The Big Build" came to Rivelands Road. A number of locals (including Parish Councillors) got involved. With vehicles and portacabins everywhere, pity the poor parish clerk trying to deliver documents to the three Parish Councillors who actually live in the road!

Problems with non-delivery or mis-direction of items of post continue to be reported to the Parish Councillors. As I stated in the last issue of the Village News these matters need to be reported to Royal Mail with details of what has happened so that the personnel involved can be identified.

The Parish Council have had the bus shelters and notice board repainted. They were starting to look a bit tired and now look much tidier. The flowers in the area have also contributed to a cheery look this summer. A more extensive area of the park was planted this time and the Borough Council were also asked to include the entrance splay to the Amenity Area off Manor Road. As always, your opinions on these initiatives would be appreciated. What else should we be doing and where?

The Parish Council's external audit for 2014-2015 has been successfully concluded. All of the relevant documents, including financial statements, can be found on the web site. And the money can be found in the bank, which is the important thing!

On the topic of council finances, this will make you laugh or cry. Penzance Town Council has spent over £56,000 trying to break the world record for the largest gathering of pirates. Most worryingly the town mayor doesn't know who authorised the expenditure or why. Spending money on getting the bus shelters painted doesn't seem so extravagant. In case you're interested (I know you are) Penzance fell 77 pirates short of the 14,232 they needed to beat Hastings.



In June we visited Barn House garden which is just off the A40 near Withington. The gardens are over two acres and are a splendid collection of 'rooms' of different styles and plantings. The really remarkable thing is that they have been created by just two people over thirty years and maintained by them as well. Now I whinge when I have to mow our pitiful patch, so what dear Shirley's husband says when he has to do two acres of fiddly bits I dread to think. The gardens are open regularly for charity purposes and we strongly recommend them for those who are interested in plantings or, indeed, cake.

Then in July our own Harry Hopkins took us to Western Australia. It confirmed the fact that I, along with most others, don't know much about that side of Australia. It did seem to show just what we suspect of Aussie life style, sun, sea, swimming, picnics, restaurants and a bit more sun. I don't think we, in Swindon Village, would enjoy it at all – just not what we are used to.

In September we have a couple of events. Our usual meeting will feature the ex-Chief Constable of Gloucestershire, Dr Tim Brain, who will give us his view of the Floods of 2007. I would appreciate a good turnout for this meeting, and particularly invite non-members to come along because most of us were affected to some degree by the deluge. The whole County came very close to going down the plug hole over those three weeks – it must have been a time of infinite stress for those trying to maintain control. Our other event is opening the village for Heritage Open Days. Over that same weekend many other buildings in Cheltenham and Gloucester that you cannot normally get into will be open. If you want to know more then use the internet or you can get a brochure of the Cheltenham openings and events from the Library or Museum.

On the Joint Core Strategy front the Examination in Public (EiP) is underway as I write. A senior planner is looking at all the evidence. The JCS has been shown to have plenty of holes but how it will all pan out, no one knows. The EiP has now been extended into next year because of the absence of viable transport and other plans.

There were also loads of different Arts & Crafts including electronics, soldering, geocaching, graffiti art, dance and drum workshops and many more. One day involved a choice of 4 different hikes with puzzles and challenges along the way. The toughest of these was "The Punisher" - a 47 kilometre hike which took groups around 12 to15 hours to complete – a real challenge. One of our Explorers, Scott Jones, took on "The Punisher" in his wheelchair and completed the hike unaided in just over 12 hours, wearing out 3 pairs of gloves in the process – what an inspiration he is!

On the second Sunday of the camp, the Jamborette opens its doors to the public for the afternoon to show everyone what we've all been up to and what goes on at a huge camp like this. Each group puts on entertainment and games and many offer food and drinks that are local to their country of origin. We had a terrific afternoon meeting many Scouts from all over the world as we ate and drank our way around the Jamborette. In just a few hours we met Scouts from: Austria, Holland, Belgium, Israel, Germany, Jordan, Canada, Malta, Ireland, Egypt, Finland, Russia and Denmark as well as Scotland, Wales and England and enjoyed many different foods and plenty of IrnBru from the Scottish groups!

Cheltenham Heritage Open Days

10th - 13th September

Heritage Open Days is a national scheme giving visitors the opportunity to explore buildings which are not normally open to the public.

Cheltenham Heritage Open Days celebrates the **buildings** and the **architecture** along with the **people** that make Cheltenham such a wonderful place to live, work and visit with a rich cultural and sporting life. There are over **50 events** including over **30 open buildings** and a **series of walks and talks** all led by experts in their field, and an outdoor exhibition of **Cheltenham in Photographs** by Cheltenham Camera Club celebrating its 150th anniversary this year. This is a unique opportunity to explore Cheltenham's fascinating heritage from its early medieval times through to its heyday as a **Regency 'Pleasure Town'** for the wealthy to the vibrant garden town that it is today. 
An added attraction is that several of the properties will be offering delicious home-made refreshments.

Your local police service is changing

Gloucestershire Constabulary puts the public at the heart of everything we do.



To make sure you get the best possible service from us, we have reviewed how we work, where we work and when we work.

Following this review we have made some changes that we will start to bring in over the second half of 2015.

We believe these changes will allow us to provide a quality service to everyone in Gloucestershire even though we receive less money to fund our service than before.

There will still be six policing areas in the county based around the city of Gloucester; the towns of Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Stroud; the Forest of Dean and the Cotswolds.

Constables and Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) will continue to work in each area but a key change will be that we will now police the county as 'one team'. This means we will deploy our officers and PCSOs at the times, and in the places, where they are needed most. We will make this assessment not just by responding to daily demand but also by assessing on a regular basis up-to-date intelligence to pinpoint where harm and vulnerability are greatest.

We have changed as well how we work so no matter where they are based our personnel will work in the same way and at the same times in all parts of the county.

These changes will make us more flexible and resilient, giving you a better service when your community needs us most. 5
