I confused you with talk of the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council and the Annual Parish Meeting last month. Both the meetings duly took place.

The former is the meeting that elects the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Parish Council for a year. At the meeting Councillor Peter Allen was re-elected to the post of Chairman and Councillor Glenn Simpson remains our Vice-Chairman.

The latter (the Annual Parish Meeting) is supposed to be a meeting for the whole of the Parish. Sadly once again the meeting was poorly attended. The meeting only draws a crowd when controversial subjects are on the agenda. We tried to involve other groups within the Parish and we are very grateful to Tony (who represented the Parochial Church Council), Liz (Village Agent) and Eileen (representing the Swindon Village Society) who gave us an insight into their respective organisations. Without any warning (perhaps that's the best way) Helen was asked to talk about progress on the Local Green Space application that the Parish Council and Save the Countryside had jointly prepared. Helen did a fine job, both in helping to prepare the application in the first place and in bringing us up to speed on the progress made.

It is a shame other organisations and the broader public did not support this endeavour. There are few opportunities for the community to come together. Perhaps next year we will advertise free beer and plans to base nuclear missiles in the parish - I am sure we will draw more of a crowd.

Staying with the Local Green Space application, this is one of the most important means by which we continue to resist having housing developments up to our doorsteps. The Joint Core Strategy (JCS) hearing is in recess at the moment and the inspector may have released her preliminary conclusions by the time you read this. We continue to be amazed that no Traffic Management Plan will be available until late in the year. It is difficult to see how the JCS can have any credibility while the traffic issue remains the elephant in the room.

In local planning matters, the plans to turn the car park near Topps Tiles into a commercial development continues to cause concern. The Parish Council has received a response from representatives of the developers addressing a number of points. However, one of the thorniest is the matter of pedestrian access from Wymans Lane to Swindon Road. Until recently pedestrians have had to make their way up a muddy bank near the gym and then traverse the car park. The Parish Council have sought to have this route "made good" as it is virtually impassable for the disabled and those with small children. The situation is now even worse as the car park has been fenced off and the prospective developer seems unwilling to incorporate a public footpath into their scheme. Whilst the footpath is not official it has

been used for many years and pedestrian safety is likely to be further compromised if no provision is made.

The other planning application that is exercising the Parish Council at the moment is the plan to convert the stables off Hyde Lane into housing. Revised plans have been submitted but they do not address our concerns (or those of the Structural Engineer).

Both these planning applications and the comments submitted by the Parish Council and others are available publicly on the Borough Council web site.

I came across an interesting report the other day that some councils are now using drones (uninhabited air vehicles or UAVs) to survey properties that are the subject of planning applications. I don't think Cheltenham Borough Council has any such ideas but perhaps you should bear this possibility in mind when you are topping up your tan in your private back garden.

We are in the early stages of considering how we might improve the park (on Wymans Lane). The Parish Council is keen to improve access (especially for parents of young children and the disabled) and incorporate facilities suitable for older children. The park is a wonderful resource that is well used by sporting types, dog walkers and families alike. We feel it could be made even better. It is owned and maintained by Cheltenham Borough Council so any initiative would need to be in partnership with them. Do you have ideas for improvements? Lets us know.

I am always reminding you that parish council meetings must by law be open to the public. I was recently reading about a fist fight breaking out between members of the public at a parish council meeting. Was it some thorny planning issue that had caused people to get inflamed? No. Apparently the argument was over allotment waiting lists. As if justifying the behaviour one of the councillors is quoted as saying "The allotments are very sought after".

A life of service

In recent months there have been a number of landmarks in the life of our Queen. On 9th September 2015 Elizabeth became the monarch who has ruled the Commonwealth for the longest period, surpassing her great-great-grandmother, Queen Victoria, and the 21st April 2016 marked her 90th birthday. Then this month there are the official celebrations on the 10th – 12th June.

A book has recently been published about the faith of the Queen. I came across the following when I was looking to buy a copy online

"A pound coin in the UK bears an image of the Queen's head, surrounded by the words: ELIZABETH II D.G.REG.F.D.' It stands for: 'Elizabeth II Dei Gratia Regina Fidei Defensor.' These words are in Latin and they mean: 'Elizabeth II, by the Grace of God, Queen, Defender of the Faith.'

The faith of which the queen is a defender is Christianity.

What does it mean for the Queen to be Defender of the Faith? It has a formal meaning because it indicates that the Queen is the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. However, it also has a personal meaning, because her reign has been characterised by acknowledgement of her dependence on Jesus Christ. This has been central to both her public pronouncements and her private devotions.

Queen Elizabeth II succeeded to the title Defender of the Faith upon her coronation on 2nd June 1953. However, her personal faith in God was clear before that. On the occasion of her 21st birthday in 1947 she made a radio broadcast in which she said this:

‘I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong.

‘But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do. I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it.’

In 2015, as part of the television broadcast she made to the nation and the commonwealth, the queen said this: ‘For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role-model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ’s example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none.’ “

Service has been a mark of the Queens reign – and it is a mark of the Church’s commitment to Christ, who came not to be served, but to serve.

In the next two months the churches in the Diocese of Gloucester are seeking to listen to their local communities, to hear their hopes for their community, and what the church might do to help them realise those dreams. So don’t be surprised if you get asked for your thoughts and ideas in the next few weeks! The church is here to serve the community – and her majesty has given us a good example of following in the footsteps of Christ in serving Him. Enjoy the celebrations and join in the conversation!

The Reader's View

Our Bishop has asked us to think and pray about the challenges which St Lawrence Church faces and about the Gloucester Diocese as a whole. In thinking about the future I am using the word 'church' to mean the congregation of people rather than the lovely building.

You will have your own ideas about the future of St Lawrence Church and its people. As Christians we believe that it is the Holy Spirit who inspires and guides us as we try to live as God wants us to. St Lawrence is part of the Church of England which itself is part of the Anglican Communion. This grouping is a worldwide family of churches in more than 160 different countries. On any one Sunday more than a million people attend Church of England services, making it the largest Christian denomination in the country.

Bishop Rachel has asked us to give our impressions of the Church of England in our local community.

For my part I believe, and have always believed, that because we work as a well-led team St Lawrence Church - and its supporters in the village - are carrying on the work of service to the community that has continued over the centuries. In thinking about where our church is now I am convinced that we have a great basis for continuing to pursue our task of ministering to the village and supporting spiritually those who live in the area. This task is not easy for an ageing congregation. For many years now we have benefitted from the inspired leadership of our incumbent ministers, and continue to be helped by the guidance of Revd. Liz Palin and our Church Wardens and PCC and other stalwarts.

Bishop Rachel has asked us to think about and pray about the position of St Lawrence in the local community in the next five years.

We all know that Swindon Village community will go on changing. We know that many more houses will be built around this ancient village. We can see that we must go on serving the community by providing a welcome to newcomers. The improvements to the interior of the building have kept the original character but have provided a much more flexible space. Recently members of the congregation have provided more opportunities for village people to meet together and the changes to the interior of the building has widened the range of uses.

When I was inspecting schools and when I was assessing a primary school assembly I decided that the big question is: "Can worship take place during the time the pupils were gathered?" I hope it doesn't sound strange but when I think about the various services and religious meetings which go on at St Lawrence the answer is that worship definitely 'happens'.

The Spirit is with us.

Sally and Debbie have been running the playgroup for 16 years and have obtained the essential qualifications required to run the successful group.

We have a team of 8 play assistants working with us which ensures the ratio of adult to children is always adhered to. The staff are all trained in First Aid and Child Protection.

The group is registered with Ofsted and our registration number is 101691. Our plans are based on the Foundation Stage Curriculum set out by the Government. This Curriculum starts in the playgroup and finishes at the end of the reception year in school.

We are registered to look after 31 children from 2 years to 5 years. The Group is split into:-

Rising 3 Group

Monday	08.45 – 11.30
Wednesday	08.45 – 11.30
Thursday	13.00 – 15.30
Friday	08.45 – 12.00

Pre-School Group

Monday	12.00 – 15.30

The charge for each session is £8.00 (whilst your child is in the rising 3 group). A total of £32.00 per week (if you choose for your child to attend all the sessions). We will notify you when your child is entitled to receive the pre-school education funding (free for 3&4). Please note that if you choose not to take the free funding with us, our charges to you will be £3.50 per hour (subject to possible change in line with GCC). Funding may also be available to families who are on a low income. To find out if your child is entitled to this you may contact the Family Information Service on 01452 427362 or Free phone 0800 542 02 02.

Once your little one joins playgroup with us there are new opportunities opening for them. No longer confined to mummy and me sessions, they can now begin to step away and discover the world on their own terms, for a while.

The real benefits of our playgroup are not confined to the academic training of young minds but rather the chance to mix with other children – to develop their own will and learn to create personal boundaries. Their language skills will grow and communication techniques will develop and personalities will have the chance to flourish.

Social skills are honed in the group setting. Learning to share, to wait, to turn take and to give space to others are not natural skills in infants and for many children they will continue to be a challenge, so practice, in a guided setting with experienced play workers is invaluable,

Free play is a wonderful gift for children and the resources available are priceless. We offer opportunities for craft, painting, growing seeds and cookery which blend seamlessly with the development of gross motor skills, using the climbing frame, ball games and scooters.

We offer educational trips and welcome visitors into the group. A trip to the local farm, the church and the local park, a visit from the Salvation Army and the local dairy farmer etc. can be madly exciting for little ones.

Generally, over 90% of our children go on to attend Swindon Village Primary School. We enjoy very good links with the school and they are very supportive to our group. In our pre-school group, the children have the opportunity to meet the head teacher and the reception teachers in their playgroup surroundings and in a school classroom. This is all preparation for a gentle transition into school life.
