It might be February when you read this but Happy New Year to you anyway. I hope you enjoyed your festive break (assuming you had one).

The Parish Council has finalised its budget for 2019-2020 (i.e. 1st April 2019 to 31st March 2020). Advertising revenue from the Village News and the rental income from the allotments helps to keep the precept down. The precept is the money we collect through council tax. The budget we have set amounts to an increase of roughly 1p per week for a house in council tax band D. As always, we strive to provide a meaningful service to residents as cost effectively as possible. We hope we won't be blown off course by Brexit!

I thought I would also take an interest in Gloucestershire County Council's budget. The minutes of our parish council meetings usually occupy four pages. I looked at the document that resulted from the County Council's cabinet meeting that covered preparation of their budget. It ran to 516 pages! Good job I didn't accidentally press "print".

Whilst on a financial theme, the name on the parish council's bank account is "Swindon Village Parish Council". This is erroneous. The correct name is Swindon Parish Council (the village is only a part of the parish). The bank has introduced a service whereby one can scan cheques on a mobile phone to deposit them. However, cheques written (correctly) to Swindon Parish Council are rejected because that is not the name of the account. One step forward, two back. Feel free to put cash through the letter box. Or Bitcoins.

Our new defibrillator is now installed at the Village Hall and registered with South West Ambulance Trust. This means that, in the event of a medical emergency, someone can ring 999 and will be given the code to unlock the defibrillator cabinet. We will also give the code to local organisations and individuals. The Parish Council will next need to consider training for key people. The device itself is very clever; it talks to users and decides whether to administer an electric shock. Isn't that what the Daleks used to do in the 70s? There is also a training video referenced from our website if you want to take a look.

I asked the woman who registered the machine whether many defibrillators actually get used. Unfortunately, the answer seems to be yes. One was installed at the school where she is a governor and three days later it saved a man's life. The device seems quite straightforward to use but please take a look at the training video so that you understand what this thing is and what it can do.

Complaints were received about fireworks being set off in the park. We don't want to be kill joys but this can be very frightening for any dogs being exercised in the vicinity. Cheltenham Borough Council has confirmed that they never give permission for this sort of activity. Anyone claiming that they have been given the go ahead is being economical with the truth.

Not quite continuing the fireworks theme (but close enough; I have lowered my standards), a parish recently held a scarecrow competition. Guy Fawkes, scarecrow, what's the difference? Anyway, one of the entries was an effigy of their parish clerk. Don't you dare.

The Parish Council have been heavily involved in helping to recruit a new wave of volunteers to take the Village Hall forward. Some of you may have participated in the meetings that were called. We hope this activity will result in a new lease of life for the hall and a well earned rest for those presently on the committee who wish to stand down. If you are not on the list of volunteers but would like to get involved please get in touch with me.

My request for volunteers to help clear the undergrowth in the Amenity Area was a disaster on two counts. Firstly, only three people came along (my sincere thanks to them). Secondly, someone had got there before us so there was very little to do. Perhaps these two factors cancel out. At least I only wasted the time of four people rather than twenty. The Borough Council may have done this work but, if there are zealous individuals out there, can I please ask that the parish council be consulted prior to any work being done on our land? This will avoid me wasting time setting up activities that are not required. It will also mean that the person doing the work will be covered by the parish council's insurance.

Talking about clearing vegetation, some people don't like the old tree stump on the corner of Dark Lane and Quat Goose Lane. It is on Highways land and so belongs to the County Council. Their tree expert does not consider it to be dangerous and apparently it is a good habitat for insects so it will be retained for the time being.

A number of people have contacted me expressing their interest in undertaking voluntary activities. I am very grateful for this but until we have

appropriate procedures in place the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) does not allow us to hold the personal details of individuals. I shall continue to “broadcast” details of events (e.g. litter picks) via our website and the Village News. By the way, the town of Farnham must be quite affluent. A recent litter pick there recovered a flat screen TV.

Even Santa is affected by GDPR. A local authority in Germany cancelled its traditional ceremony where children hang their Christmas wish lists for Santa on a tree in the market because of GDPR concerns. The tradition saw kids write their name and address so Santa knew where to deliver their presents. However, under the GDPR, the local authority decided it must obtain written permission from the parents of the 4,000 children who usually take part. Surely that must be easy compared with Santa’s task of visiting them all.

I write the article for the Christmas Village News in mid-November. It is very hard to think of appropriate seasonal messages when it is effectively still autumn. If I may, a couple of small additions made with the benefit of hindsight. A big thank you to Ian Brown for collecting the allotment rents again. I am also told that the noticeboard at the allotments has been refurbished by Ian and/or his trusty helpers. Thanks for that. Thanks also to Yvonne, our newest councillor but one, for entering the Christmas Tree Festival with a Parish Council tree. We submitted photographs of ourselves to decorate it. My photo looked very menacing so it is not surprising that we didn’t take first prize.

Well it's the beginning of another new year as I write....and it's filled with all the promises of fresh beginnings and resolutions to be adhered to. Ideas for resolutions will probably skirt around losing a few pounds after Christmas to making more dramatic life decisions. Whatever your resolutions might be, making changes to ones life is far from easy, especially when those changes impact on the lives of others.

Some may know that I have recently become a father; and a new baby signals new starts and forces us in to this new world of fresh beginnings. In a way, it forces us to say goodbye to some things in order to embrace that which is new. The Presentation of Christ in the Temple, which we celebrate on the 2nd of this month encompasses this idea. The story about this old man who, when he finally gets to see this little baby Jesus in the Temple realises that he can at last die in peace, says something about laying aside one's life in order for other lives to thrive. In some ways, it becomes sacrificial in nature to do this. Decreasing so as another can increase is a familiar theme. Simeon hints at this but it also resembles the relationship between Jesus and his cousin, John the Baptist. "He must become more important, while I become less important", he says. (Jn. 3: 30)

The birth of Christ demonstrates that change does impact on all of our lives. It's humbling to acknowledge that our lives are never completely our own when our own life story influences the stories that others eventually live out.

And so as the presentation marks the beginning of this, another new month and year, I pray that its lesson can deepen our understanding of our own existence as a people in relationship in all kinds of ways and with all its variants.... in this cosmic drama of God's chosen people.

Christmas Tree Festival

It seems a long time ago now but the Christmas Tree Festival attracted a lot of visitors who experienced the “wow factor” produced by a record 23 trees. In addition to the group trees we had more individuals taking part this time. As usual we were all amazed at the ideas and ingenuity behind the decorations.

A young lady called Amelia received a record number of votes for her “Crafty Christmas” tree which was hung with Christmas decorations that Amelia had made using several forms of craft – knitting, crochet, pom-poms, baking, melting plastic beads – and which stood over a clay model of a Christmas dinner. Well done, Amelia!

The Wine Club’s tree was covered in miniature glasses, bottles and cocktail umbrellas and was very colourful. Two people had chosen gardening as their theme with real sprouts hanging from one of them. The Chatterbox tree was covered in an assortment of representations of hobbies including miniature paintings on easels.

For those of you who remember your guesses, there were 346 Lego pieces in the nativity scene; the nearest guess was 350, from two people. The raffle prizes were won by Jim Groves, Pene Manford, Brenda Stanford and Rose Martyn.

The Christmas Tree Festival has become a regular event on the parish calendar, having started in 2007 as part of the major fundraising effort after part of the church ceiling fell down. Historic buildings such as our church require ongoing maintenance and repair and our current project is to replace the roof on the tower, before it leaks! So, in addition to the Christmas Tree Festival being a fun and sociable event, I’m pleased to say that over the weekend we raised £834 for the restoration fund.

The Festival theme was “Hobbies and Pastimes” The staff at the Early Years playgroup even wrote a poem to go with their tree.

Happy Chinese New Year


The Chinese New Year starts on 5th February and this will be the Year of the Pig.
