Swindon Parish Council

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

The Council have now signed off the paperwork for 2018-2019 and everything is available to view on the website. The closure of the year makes this a good time to review our successes and failures for the twelve months.

We installed a defibrillator at the Village Hall. Defibrillators in public areas have had a significant role in ensuring the survival of heart attack victims. A local paramedic gave three of us an introduction to CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) and the use of a defibrillator. There is a separate article elsewhere.

The Council also purchased a noticeboard to be sited outside the Cross Hands to serve the southern part of the parish. Installation requires Gloucestershire County Council to conduct a search for services in the grass verge. Sadly GCC have been uncommunicative for many months. I am hopeful that this will be resolved within the next few weeks. As an aside, it should be noted that the noticeboard at the entrance to the allotments has been refurbished at no cost to the Council by the allotment holders.

The Council was delighted to be approached by Spirax Sarco as part of a community engagement initiative. A joint team comprising Spirax Sarco employees and local residents have done some litter picking and another event will take place on 18th June. We are meeting at 2:00pm in the park car park (near the Mary Godwin pavilion). Litter pickers, rubbish bags and encouragement will be available.

The growth in the hedge along Manor Road causes problems to pedestrians every year. A major part of the issue is that ownership of the hedge is disputed between Spirax Sarco and Gloucestershire County Council. I hope to get that resolved soon so that we have a lasting solution but, in the meantime and to their credit, Spirax Sarco have cut the hedge back.

In an attempt to address the issue of the speed and volume of traffic going through Swindon Village some of our councillors met with Gloucestershire Highways. Certain measures were agreed at that meeting but this initiative has also been stalled due to the lack of action from GCC. The Council

recognises that it may need to invest money to address these problems (e.g. electronic speed signs).

In August new play equipment was installed in the park. The Council had budgeted to spend money on this project. In the end it was financed by Cheltenham Borough Council, and we are grateful to them for that.

There were fears for the future of the Village Hall following the resignation of the Village Hall Management Committee after many years of service to the parish. The Parish Council sought support from the community for this important asset and a new Committee has been formed to take the hall forward. The bar and the hall is being opened on Friday nights during May and I know that the first night was a great success. The hall will also have hosted a poll for the European Elections on 23rd May. It was predicted that the biggest winners would be the candidates supporting departure from Europe. Does anybody understand what is going on?

We welcomed two new councillors during the year. Yvonne joined in June 2018 and James in July 2018. Like buses, you wait a long time then two come along at once. They are busy people but have brought their energy and enthusiasm to the Council. However, we still have four vacancies.

In the park the sundial mosaic, owned by the Parish Council, has deteriorated badly. The Council is seeking professional advice to not only restore it but to make it more resilient. This is likely to involve significant expenditure.

The chestnut trees in the Amenity Area also represent another large potential cost. The trees are dying. Work was undertaken to remove some larger boughs but there remains much to be done.

Having invested in the defibrillator and the noticeboard our reserves now stand at £20,761.72. This is a healthy figure but, as I have highlighted, we may have to finance some major works in the future.

We thought that winning some Local Green Space in the JCS was one of our triumphs. However, as you have been told, the Planning Inspector reviewing the Cheltenham Local Plan (which should be compliant with the JCS) has decided that she wants to review this. The JCS was subject to multiple reviews and consultations before being signed off by the Secretary of State. It seems strange and undemocratic that a Planning Inspector can potentially make fundamental changes to its provisions when it is beyond consultation. We are grateful to Borough Councillor Flo Clucas for continuing the fight with our support. Cruiser/boy racer activity has again been reported in the area. We are hopeful that "sleeping policemen" will be installed in Malmesbury Road to discourage this.

The Parish Council was given a presentation by developers who have purchased the old Vibixa site on Wymans Lane/Runnings Road. They are planning to speculatively develop the site as industrial and trade counter units. Councillors were able to comment on a number of issues prior to formal submission of a planning application. Demolition of the old buildings could start in August.

Through the Parish Council website I receive lots of messages offering me everything from noticeboards and playground equipment to Russian brides. It is amazing how attractive I appear to be to stunning women from the Caucuses who have never set eyes on me. Anyway, one of the most bizzare messages I received requested access to our premises to perform paranormal investigations. It wasn't spam; once again we had been mistaken for Swindon, Wiltshire.

Book Review

'Field Guide to the English Clergy – A Compendium of Diverse Eccentrics, Pirates, Prelates and Adventurers, Some Even Practising'

By The Revd Fergus Butler-Gallie (published by Oneworld Publications, 175 pages, £12.99)

Never, in one place, are you likely to come across such a bizarre, unique and funny group of clerics as in this delightful book! Not terribly well known until a rapid re-print after its publication last year, the book began to appear in many clergy Christmas stockings last December.

The Revd Butler-Gallie, a Church of England curate, has painstakingly collected 'brief lives' of some of the oddest individuals ever to have graced England's churches. It is perfectly possible to read the book at one sitting because you begin eagerly to anticipate the next clergy example, usually even more eccentric than the last. I am loathe to dilute the joy by quoting examples. The book is handily divided into sections entitled 'Eccentrics, Nutty Professors, Bon Viveurs, Prodigal Sons and Rogues' with a good glossary for the uninitiated.

My favourite, if forced to name one, would probably be the Revd Ian Graham-Orlebar, Rector of Barton-le-Clay (1926 – 2016). Sporting disdain for clergy who used their motor cars, Graham-Orlebar would travel round his parish on a ride-on lawnmower. When Britain joined the EEC in 1973, he caused disruption by solemnly informing his parishioners at a parish information evening that the day had been shortened to ten hours, producing a specially adapted clock to demonstrate, and that the highway code had been changed making driving on the right compulsory and roundabouts obsolete, 'resulting in a short and very localised spell of chaos on the roads of south Bedfordshire.'

There is much to enjoy here and hopes are high for a second volume.

Battle of the Bands – Saturday 8th June

Defibrillator Training

On 16th May two of your councillors and I met with Tim, a locally based paramedic, to get some familiarisation with the use of a defibrillator. Tim brought some training equipment with him. You can see two dummies in the photograph.



Calm down, I'll do the jokes if you don't mind.

Tim works for the South West Ambulance Trust. You will be pleased to know that the Trust is the biggest and best performing in the country.

Tim dispelled a few myths about responding to a cardiac arrest. These are the important facts:

- Call the emergency services. It helps if you have someone with you; one person can fetch a defibrillator or converse with a call handler whilst one person attends to the patient.
- Giving a precise location to the emergency services is vital. A landline does this automatically; a mobile can be less precise.
- If the patient is indoors ensure that the door is unlocked so that the emergency services can gain entry.
- CPR (strong chest compressions twice a second) is VITAL. This does not restart a stopped heart but keeps the blood, which will still contain some oxygen, circulating.
- Open the defibrillator package and switch on the machine. It will speak to you and tell you EXACTLY what you should do.

We thought the defibrillator was the whole answer but administering CPR is absolutely vital to obtaining a good outcome.

We are very grateful to Tim for freely giving his time. Tim is prepared to run another familiarisation session. If you are interested in attending one and learning more please let me know.

Save the Countryside 12th Annual Walk

Around 50 of us had a lovely afternoon on Sunday, walking the fields at the North West of Cheltenham between Swindon Village and Elmstone Hardwicke. This event has become such a lovely local community event, enjoying our local countryside, meeting our friends and neighbours. The rain held off and the fields were beautiful.

A big thanks to Mike and Anne in Elmstone Hardwicke for refreshing us half way around and to Helen Harris and her kind friend for their help as terrific tea ladies afterwards.

Some of these fields are destined to become new housing development in future years, but the team are delighted that a continuous area all around the village had been agreed to be retained as local green space. Following years of collaborative work on the local green space matter, we thought we had reached a good reasonable conclusion at the end of the Joint Core Strategy In 2017. The Government inspector confirmed that we would retain an agreed area around Swindon Village as local green space, to retain its village identity. This is less than 7% of the land removed from the green belt for housing in the JCS. The exact details were to be finalised in the Cheltenham plan. However, a new government inspector assigned to verify the soundness of the Cheltenham plan, now actually wants to retroactively revise the local green spaces assigned by the JCS Inspector. She would like us only to have a small corner of the area that we had been granted.

Of course her recommendation has not been accepted by Swindon Parish Council and Save the Countryside. We reminded her and Cheltenham Borough Council planning team of the thorough detail that the teams have gone through to ensure that the Local green space is in line with National planning policy framework.

We wait with baited breath to ensure that the fair and robust (all be it lengthy) process of the JCS to enable the local green space has not been discarded by one swift move by another inspector. Again we are pleased to have the support of our councillors on this matter.

As soon as I hear any more from Cheltenham planning team or the government inspector I will share an update. In the meantime we continue to enjoy our precious green spaces.

Now Mr Philby never lived in Swindon Village so it was stretching things a little to include him under the 'local history' talk heading. But the fact is that Robert is a very good speaker and it sort of followed on from the Bletchely Park theme that he took us through over the previous two years so we stretched the point. And sure enough it was a first rate talk on a subject that most of us remember as the scandal of 'The Third Man' from our youth but the details in our minds were sketchy. Philby was the last of the three spies in our midst, after Burgess and McClean, and the last to be unveiled. Of course there was a fourth in the shape of Anthony Blunt but he probably did less damage. Philby certainly lived a strange life and was a firm traitor to his country while becoming a hero to the Soviet Union. He was guilty of causing many deaths and it was pleasing to find that, on the whole, once he had fled to the East his life was not a happy one. Indeed his life must have been one of constant stress being on the brink of discovery a number of times.

Making way for hedgehogs in Swindon Village

Hedgehogs are surviving better in urban areas than in rural. Overall threats to hedgehogs include habitat fragmentation, fewer invertebrates, increased road traffic and litter, and climate change; hedgehogs face different specific dangers in urban areas than rural areas but urban hedgehogs are thought to be declining less rapidly than rural.

Ensuring that our urban gardens and green spaces are managed for wildlife is a good way to support hedgehogs: leaving wilder areas good for nesting, not using slug pellets, checking before lighting bonfires and strimming, and ensuring that there's a step out of ponds. You can check your own garden or local green space 'score' by taking the garden assessment 'How hedgehog friendly is your garden?' <u>https://</u> www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/2W3ZBRL

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust is working with a committed team of hedgehog champions to identify areas of Swindon Village where wildlife friendly gardens and green spaces can be linked to create 'hedgehog ways', gifting hedgehogs safe spaces and an opportunity to thrive in the area. If you would like to be part of this, please do email **georgia.spooner@gloucestershirewildlifetrust.co.uk** who is coordinating the project.

Hedgehog Way is supported by the People's Trust for Endangered Species and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. Hedgehog numbers have fallen significantly in the last few decades. It is estimated that there are 1.5 million hedgehogs in the UK, down from 36 million in the 1950s. According to the People's Trust for Endangered Species, losses in towns and cities appear to have slowed, and the number of hedgehogs found in urban gardens at night may be increasing.

There was a tremendous turn-out and that's inspired us to open weekly for the rest of May from 6.30pm onwards; lots of volunteers have signed up to help run the bar and, with a growing pool of talent, we should be able to open regularly throughout the summer. Of course, if attendances decrease markedly then we might reassess and reduce to opening fortnightly or monthly but let's see what happens - if the village wants the bar open then we'll do everything we can to make it so.

The environment is becoming a concern to a growing number of people and we invited an energy saving advisor to visit and advise us on how the hall can be run more efficiently by producing an energy management report - simple measures can save money but also reduce our cost to the planet. We've already swapped the bulbs over the bar to LEDs and installed some smart plugs to control the bar fridges and stop them running 24/7. Other suggestions we could take involve insulating the cellar to prevent warmth entering the room - a project for somebody perhaps! There are grants available for other energy saving projects which is something that we are exploring so watch this space. The report was compiled and presented to some of the committee but, as I write this, that was only a few days ago and we've not fully digested it but we'll seek to implement as much of it as possible.

The black banquet chairs have had a bit of TLC applied and are looking much better thanks to Maija and Carol's sterling efforts and a minicommittee has been formed to look at renovating the hall and updating some of the fixtures and fittings - they're a small group and keen for volunteers to help them out, if you've got any ideas about how the hall should look or operate then this is a great opportunity for you to make your influence count.

The website, social media accounts, email address and mobile phone have all been a tremendous success and Jana, our bookings secretary, has done an amazing job co-ordinating bookings and liaising with different groups - we already have more bookings planned this year than the whole of 2018 but not quite at the level in 2017 but we're not even half way through the year yet so the signs are promising.

To end, I'd like to continue to introduce the committee members each month and this month is our treasurer, Karren Parsons. Karren is married to Matt and they have two daughters who both went to Swindon Village Primary: Katie is at university in York and Bekah goes to Chichester in September. Karren runs a bookkeeping company based in the village so becoming treasurer seems the obvious way to fill her time. When she's not counting the pennies and shouting at the Chair for buying too much gin, she can also be found working behind the bar!
