One of the major concerns on our patch is the traffic, both its speed and its volume. The Parish Council is always trying to think of ways to improve the situation. We have engaged with Gloucestershire Highways to get some figures that will back up our concerns. Evidence carries more weight than opinion! We have warned you before about curious objects appearing in the parish to monitor dormice and hedgehogs. This time you may have seen a number of sets of rubber tubes laid across the road. These are all about gathering that evidence and nothing to do with monitoring mammal movements.

Another traffic-related issue is the inconvenience caused to local residents by inconsiderate parking around the school. A minority of parents of children at the school park their cars across drives and on road junctions. This is infuriating for the residents and dangerous for the children. The school has grown in size over the years, as has the problem. Whilst it is not the Parish Council's problem we would love to be part of the solution. To this end we are hoping to get together with representatives from the school and the police to discuss what can be done. An alert was recently published by the local police (see separate page) indicating that we are not alone in suffering this issue.

At this point it would be appropriate to remind everyone that parents can park in the car park at the Seasons complex in Quat Goose Lane to drop off and pick up children attending the school. It is only a five minute walk to the school. We are grateful to Cheltenham Town Football Club for making this facility available.

The hedge in Manor Road causes issues every spring and summer when the growing shrubbery makes the footway too narrow for pushchairs and wheelchairs. There is still some debate about whether the hedge belongs to Gloucestershire Highways or Spirax Sarco. I am grateful to Spirax Sarco who have done the decent thing and agreed to take responsibility for the hedge for the time being. It has been cut back and is now scheduled to receive a regular "haircut".

Spirax Sarco staff also joined local residents on our recent litter pick. Fifteen bags of rubbish were collected. Here is a photograph in case you don't know what fifteen bags of rubbish look like!



What's that? You know what bags of rubbish look like but would rather see the volunteers? Here is a selection.

These people braved continuous drizzle. Their only reward was the fuzzy feeling of a job well done. Plus a monster bag of chocolates and sweets. All the wrappers were properly disposed of. Please try to join us next time.



In another act of public spiritedness a local resident has put up some notices asking people to clear up after their dogs, another hot item for the Parish Council (if you'll pardon the pun). Fixed Borough Council notices seem to have very limited effect. This more personal approach appears to have struck a chord. We will see if this improvement continues.

I realise I haven't been giving you your regular dose of Parish Council legal requirements. I must admit I tripped over the law recently by going on holiday (I know; it won't happen again). Councils can only make decisions, particularly with regard to spending money, at a properly constituted meeting. This means the meeting must be advertised three clear days in advance. When I should have been publishing notices I was sunning myself on the Kennet and Avon Canal. As a result the meeting had to be delayed a week.

You've lapped that up so I'll push my luck and give you a bit more of the legal stuff. We are now in a formal period during which people can examine, question and even challenge the Council's accounts. This right is given to "local electors or other interested person", so basically anyone! The period ends on 26<sup>th</sup> July. I have always said that the Parish Council's accounting is transparent; feel free to examine records and question what we do. The special thing about this period is that if I can't explain something to you to your satisfaction you can invoke the external auditor. Of course, your challenge must be that we have done something illegal and not just that you don't like the way we spend your money.

Finally, the horse trough continues to look magnificent. It is not just the Manor Road hedge and my lawn that are growing like crazy. Thank you to Neil, our local landscape gardener.



That's it until September. Enjoy the remainder of the summer.

## Reminder About Parking Outside Of Schools

We would like to remind parents to please be aware of where they are parking when dropping off and picking their children up from school.

This reminder comes after a man was arrested yesterday (Monday) after becoming abusive and aggressive towards a PCSO who spoke to him after he had parked on yellow zig zag lines outside of a school.

The 42-year-old man was subsequently arrested on suspicion of driving whilst disqualified, being in possession of class A drugs and using threatening and offensive words in a public place.

He has since been released under investigation pending further enquiries.

Sergeant Julia Martin-Jones from the Cheltenham Neighbourhood Policing Team said: “We do patrols at all of our schools in Cheltenham and I would like to remind the public that parking on zig zag lines is an offence and it can put children, or any member of the public, at risk of harm.

“We are here to keep the community safe and the safety of your children whilst they are coming in and out of school is our priority.

“Whilst my staff are carrying out their duties I will not tolerate any abusive behaviour towards them and appropriate action will be taken if needed.”


## **Battle of the Bands**



Another busy month for everyone at the Hall as the summer apparently starts - the last few weeks have seen lots of rain but not so much in the way of sunshine. The May Bank Holiday saw us put on a community barbecue where we provided the barbecue, a bouncy castle, buns and condiments whilst everyone brought their own meats and veggie burgers (and halloumi!) - despite the showers we persevered and a great day was had.

The website, email, social media and mobile phone are all combining to get the word out that we're available for regular and individual hires - some of the new regular classes we host are Zumba, Trampolining, morning Bootcamp, Musical Theatre and regular fitness classes and these are in addition to the art, wine, medals, and Wednesday Club plus the Village Society, Guides and Scouts and Early Years. Most weekends also see the main hall being rented out for parties; the lounge can be rented with or without the bar being open so there's hopefully space for everyone. The Friday night bars from 6.30pm continue to be well attended and will be continuing throughout the summer as long as we have people to run the bar - our list of volunteers is growing and you can get involved as much or as little as you want; every hour helps. It's been great to see so many people getting together and every week people are showing up for the first time of hopefully many more. The gin selection is proving popular (we currently stock dry gins such as Hendricks, Cotswold Dry, Botanist as well as flavoured gins with raspberry, rhubarb and ginger, Seville orange, and parma violet) and the beer range has been extended to include Peroni on draught as well as the usual Carlsberg; the other draughts are Cotswold Pale Ale and Stowford Press cider. If you have a favourite tippie then mention it to the bar volunteers and we'll see what we can do.

Our Facebook page is getting lots of interactions and has been a great way to keep in touch - search for Swindon Village Hall to keep updated on what's on.

We've commenced some more projects, one of which is to install some speakers and an amplifier which will be able to be connected to the TV when it goes back on the wall. My ultimate aim is to have a PA system in the main hall too for use for fitness classes, conferences, film nights (we

could hire/borrow/buy a projector and screen) etc. and hopefully be able to link it to the bar system too for full building sound - a grand scheme that might not come off but I feel it's good to have ambition!

# Hedgehog Survey

We were one of about eight households that took part in the hedgehog survey in Swindon Village organised by the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust last month.



All the instructions and kit we needed were provided by the Trust's hedgehog expert, Georgia.

The tunnel itself was "flat-packed" - a piece of stiff plastic which folded into a 2ft long triangular tube big enough for a hedgehog to walk through, with a loose floor panel. We placed the tunnel alongside our garden fence where we had seen a hedgehog last year and secured it to the ground with tent pegs.

At each end of the floor panel we clipped a sheet of A4 paper in place, followed by a line of masking tape across it which we smeared with sticky ink, a mixture of charcoal and cooking oil. Then we had to put a small amount of hedgehog food in the middle of the floor panel and slide it into the tunnel. The idea was that if a hedgehog went in for the food from either end of the tunnel it would walk through the ink and leave footprints on the paper. We checked and changed the paper every morning and put fresh food in the tunnel every evening, just for five nights.

At the end of the survey we sent the sheets with prints back to Georgia.

## Our results...

We got hedgehog footprints on two of the five nights of the survey. However, just because there were no prints didn't mean there were no hedgehogs... and this, for us, was the exciting bit...

Georgia had just one wildlife camera, triggered by movement, and we were the lucky ones who used it. On the first night we got lovely photos of a hedgehog sniffing around the tunnel but it didn't go in to it! We had many more hedgehog photos as well as a few of squirrels and birds as daylight came. Weren't we lucky!





Having established where hedgehogs are, Georgia's next step is to encourage neighbours to make just a small hole, about the size of a CD, in their garden fences so that the hedgehogs can move easily between gardens to increase their feeding areas. Hedgehogs are good for gardens and if we can provide a large enough feeding area they may not need to risk their lives crossing roads.

By the way, if you are thinking of feeding hedgehogs please give them dog or cat food (but not containing fish). The biscuit type foods are fine. You can even buy a special hedgehog food. A shallow bowl of water would be good too.

Our May adventure was a walk through Lineover Wood led by John Heathcott. John has spent many years with a band of Woodland Trust volunteers looking after Lineover and we could not have had a better guide. We walked down through the wood and so started off at the best bit. The upper half of the wood is unimproved ancient woodland managed by coppicing in rotation. That is to say areas of trees are cut to the ground and grow again with multiple stems from the stool to provide a wood harvest. All our native trees do this rather than dying when they are felled. In particular the wood has many superb lime trees that provide fine grained wood which is particularly suitable for carving. This coppicing allows light into the wood which encourages biodiversity including flowers, insects and birds. We saw at least two sorts of orchid on our travels, in part because we had Carol Kear with us - she is a good orchid spotter, having a meadow above Prestbury with several varieties.

The bottom half of Lineover is 'improved'. It was historically an oak forest but the oaks were all felled during and after the war and, because of the national shortage of timber, they were replaced by fast growing conifers. Now, many of these are fine trees but not native and with a tendency to blank out undergrowth and restrict biodiversity. So the Woodland Trust is felling many but not all of these and replacing them with native species.

Not all is rosy though. Ash die back has now arrived in the county and many of the ash trees were showing the first signs by way of branch tips without leaves. The older ashes will take a while to succumb but succumb they will. At least there is better news regarding Elms. Some Wych Elms in England have started to show resistance to Dutch Elm disease so we may have our beloved elms back at some time in the future.

There was much more to see and learn; you should have been there.

Also on the Wildlife front, we have been trying to see how much hedgehog life there is in the village with the hope of encouraging them. There have been a number of reports of them, dead and alive, so we hope to spread the message of how you can support your local hedgehog. Rather more lovable than politicians right now. Vote hedgehog!

In July Dr Tim Brain will be back to tell us about Gloucestershire Battles. Visitors are welcome.

Then in August we have our annual garden party which will be at 3, Swindon Hall. It is a members only occasion but there is plenty of time to become a member and come and look at some Second World War bomb damage while holding a glass of lukewarm white wine.

Finally, we had better mention September when we will have a talk by Arthur Ball on the wildlife of Dowdeswell Reservoir Nature Reserve. Since this reserve is just across the road from Lineover Wood it is almost as though we did some pre-planning. Don't worry though – it was just an accident.

The resolutions for a better bus service and the smear test were passed by 96% and 97% respectively. One of the guest speakers was Maggie Philbin of TV fame. She gave a very interesting talk about her career and the many programmes she has been involved in. We enjoyed a meal at Gianni's and tea at Annette's. We spent a day wrapping bottles in newspaper ready for our tombola stall at the Centenary Village Fair in Cirencester in July.

Also in July we have arranged a visit to the Houses of Parliament, an evening at John Lewis, a meal at The Artisan restaurant, a talk on Queen Æthelflæd, bowls and croquet taster days, walks, book and craft club meetings and Wendy has a social afternoon at her house.

The Stuntman Dick Sheppard came along to our last meeting in June with his wife/manager and a very interesting evening followed. Mr Sheppard has done many stunts on motor bikes, cars and horses and appeared in films doing the stunts in place of the actors. Probably the most famous film he advised on was The Italian Job starring Michael Caine. Special effects were used in the film when the Mini was on two wheels sideways through a narrow street as it proved impossible to do as the street was much too narrow and the car too wide when tipped sideways.

Mr Sheppard still holds many world records to this day; some will never be beaten as the stunt has been withdrawn due to "Health & Safety". His main claim to fame is riding a motor bike through a tunnel of fire and this record still stands. He is also proud of the fact that although he wrote off over two thousand cars, he is alive to tell the tale. Another record in the Guinness Book of Records is that his name appears more often and over a longer period of time than any other record holder. Mr Sheppard now trains people to do some of the stunts, including driving a car sideways on two wheels. Many questions were asked by our members and the evening was a success. Mr Sheppard and his wife stayed to supper which this month was provided by Elaine and Margaret, so many thanks to them.

## **Survival Skills**

Four of our Scouts from Swindon Village took part in the County organised Survival Skills weekend held up in woods near Duntisbourne Abbots over the last bank holiday weekend. ## **Cub and Scout Camp at Cranham Scout HQ**

The first full weekend in June saw 30 of our Cubs and Scouts camping together up at Cranham. The weather forecast was for heavy thundery showers throughout Friday night and Saturday, but, somehow, we managed to miss most of it and, after the rain early on Saturday morning, we had a relatively good weekend.

After breakfast on Saturday the Cubs boarded the minibus and travelled to Fairford Scout HQ which is by a lake. This was the venue for the Beavers and Cubs District Water Activity Day organised by Shelley Wright and her merry band of helpers and volunteers. Our Cubs were joined by around half of our Beaver Scouts and during the day got to try their hand at Bell-boating, Canoeing and Kayaking as well as many games and activities on dry land. 
