## SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

I have addressed the issue of the travellers elsewhere in this issue, so I will pick up the other business from September in this article.

On the evening of 6<sup>th</sup> September, a pall of dense black smoke could be seen hanging over the copse near Hyde Lane. Apparently a large number of tyres were stored there and they were ablaze.



I had assumed this was a random act of arson. However, a few days later there were blazes in two of the fields between Hyde Lane and Swindon lane.



Is this legal? I have to say that I thought farmers were no longer able to burn materials in this way. Our Borough Councillor is asking questions. In this day and age fires like this are inappropriate and contribute to Cheltenham's already poor air quality.

Of course, with summer receding, thoughts will turn to bonfire night. Every year we do receive some complaints about bonfires. I don't think small bonfires are illegal but please be considerate of your neighbours, and also the effect fireworks have on pets. We'll remind you in the November issue when the day is upon us!

The Amenity Area along the brook between Manor Court and Spirax Sarco is owned by the Parish Council. It is part of the Conservation Area that is at the heart of Swindon Village. I mentioned the two problematic chestnut trees last time. Because they are in a Conservation Area we need planning permission to do any major work on them. I thought they were both dying but the Borough Council tree officer now thinks that one might be recovering. The other one is not long for this world. However, an environmentally friendly way of dealing with it might be to remove its branches but leave it standing. It will then continue to provide a habitat for wildlife. We will be seeking the opinion of an expert before we plan a way forward. Given its inaccessibility, leaving the tree standing would certainly be a cheaper solution than trying to extract the trunk along the footpath.

A resident of Manor Court visited us at our September council meeting to ask about the tree branches that are encroaching on his property from the Amenity Area. The Parish Council will need to take responsibility for these and we aim to address them at the same time as our problematic chestnuts.

While we are discussing green issues, please note that Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> October is our planned public meeting to discuss climate change. We hope you will support us. We are determined to play our part, however small, and to encourage others to do the same. Perhaps you will have ideas about what we should be doing as a Council.

I am still progressing our application to the diocese for permission to do some restoration work on the war memorial in the churchyard. We hope to have the work done and the memorial looking suitably spry for the commemoration ceremony. Remembrance (or Armistice) Day is always on


the 11<sup>th</sup> November. Remembrance Sunday is on the second Sunday of November, so this year that is the 14<sup>th</sup>.

The Parish Council now has a very healthy eight councillors and only one remaining vacancy. The Village Hall committee has worked wonders but could now do with more volunteers to keep up the momentum. If you can spare a bit of time I'm sure one of the committee members would be delighted to hear from you.

I have no more train articles for you but I visited a friend the other day who is very into his railways. He works on real steam engines during the day and collects model trains the rest of the time (although he refuses to describe it as a passion!). He showed me a wonderfully detailed metal model of a steam engine. Apparently it was a bargain at £900. I don't feel so bad about those golf clubs now.

## The Travellers' Latest Incursion

I am aware that the headline item of business from last month is yet another incursion onto the park by the travellers.

A meeting was held between Cheltenham Borough Council (CBC), Ubico (who maintain the park on behalf of CBC), the police, some of our Parish Councillors and our Borough Councillor. This subject is very emotive so let's examine some facts. I have to say I was not present at the meeting and am reliant on reports from those that were.

The meeting agreed that the way in which the locks are physically protected needed to be improved. In the past, strong locks appeared to have been replaced by weaker ones that were "more convenient for Ubico operatives to use". It is unclear whether this was a factor in the travellers gaining entry. Anyway, on the 6<sup>th</sup> September it was confirmed that new measures had been put in place.

A CBC officer wrote to me "Confirming that the new locks and lock shrouds are in place. The locks are now chained to the barriers and cannot be removed or lost. The lock pattern on the height barrier is unique to this lock, and can only be replicated on authority from CBC. Only CBC, Ubico and authorised staff will have access to them. Further box section steel will be installed next to the height barrier to replace the wooden post and rail".

There was also a plan for Ubico staff to be properly briefed about the locking/unlocking protocols.

I went down to the park on the 8<sup>th</sup> September to look at the new security arrangements. A Ubico employee was working at the southern end of the field. Imagine my amazement when I found that the park was completely unlocked.



So much for stronger, less accessible locks. This is totally unacceptable. CBC recognised this and have apologised. However, this has happened (and been reported) on a number of occasions in the past and I always receive an assurance that it won't happen again.

There appeared to be concerns as to whether the keys to the locks at the parks were being properly managed. As I understand it, there was no sign that the travellers had broken the locks to gain entry; the locks were simply nowhere to be seen when the travellers were inside the park.

We have addressed the need to prevent the travellers from gaining access to the park. The other aspect of the issue is that, if they do gain entry, what response and protection can residents expect of the police?

The only thing they could say in response to our concerns about intimidation and criminal activity was that police resources are limited. It doesn't sound as if we can expect anything more or better if it happens again.

At its September meeting the Parish Council discussed the above points. Every incursion by the travellers costs thousands of pounds to clean up and, if bailiffs have to be used, thousands of pounds in eviction costs. Even if bailiffs are not used CBC officers and the courts spend time generating and considering the necessary legal documents.

We were reminded in the Parish Council meeting that we should consider what these people do rather than who they are. Not all travellers behave in this way and there are probably criminals within every community.

As a result of our meeting we will be writing a report to discuss with CBC and the police. We believe that some of the responses we have received are inadequate and that more can be done to protect the community. Money spent on prevention is an investment; money spent clearing up the mess is money down the drain- and it is our money.

As ever, please let me or your councillors know your views.

## Village Hall

Well, autumn is finally making itself felt, with russet hues taking over from lush greens and the days are certainly feeling shorter as we drift past the autumnal equinox and the long nights of winter beckon.

Since taking over as chair of the village hall committee, I've seen lots of things change and others remain the same. The sense of community seems undiminished despite the ravages of the Covid-19 pandemic and it's heartening to see folk returning to our regular Friday night bars and our social clubs returning to their usual slots. New bar volunteers have been learning the ropes and all are welcome to lend a hand for as much or as little time as you can afford (get in touch via phone, email, Facebook or in person if you'd like to help out). Changes have been seen in the many projects that have come to fruition from LED lights, solar panels and smart thermostats to new booking systems, websites and a new TV. The insulation is still waiting to be fitted and this is planned for the end of October during half-term; just in time for the chill of winter. Once fitted, they should work nicely with the destratification fans to keep the hall cosy and comfortable. I'm incredibly proud of what the committee has achieved since taking over.

My own term as chair is shortly coming to an end as I've decided to step down at the end of December after nearly three years at the helm. I've thoroughly enjoyed my time contributing to improving our village hall, but the demands of home and work life aren't leaving me much space to dedicate to chairing the committee. I'm happy to continue contributing with any projects that may come up (eco and sound systems are particular passions of mine) and will happily do stints on (either side of) the bar but I feel that it's time for a new chair to take the reins. I intend to support the new chair as much or as little as they need. We have a well run and vibrant village hall which is supported and managed by a dedicated group of volunteers. The committee is a small group and all have other demands on their time so any additions to their ranks will be very welcome - so get involved as everyone has something to offer.

Throughout my tenure, I've wanted our village hall to be the best it can be, whilst minimising its impact on the environment - whilst a laudable aim in itself, this has the added benefit of reducing the running costs meaning that more money is available for future improvements. Several grants have also been successfully applied for over the years so a lot of these improvements to our hall's efficiency

projects. If you have a suggestion for what can be improved, replaced or installed then don't be shy - your ideas can be taken forward by the committee and its new chair, you could even be co-opted onto the committee for a period whilst managing your own project.

Ours is a modest village hall, nestled in a small village on the edge of a medium sized town but our ambitions don't have to be constrained by geography or history. We can write our own story and have the best village hall this side of Bishops Cleeve. Let's face it, Tithe Barn or Stoke Orchard aren't going to be outdone by our efforts but we can at least try! But it can only happen when lots of hands make light work (as my teacher used to say when we all had to put our hands in the air to 'turn' the light on).

The Society garden party occurred without it actually raining! Just the right number of people turned up to remove all the sausage rolls. It was very pleasing to see some new faces; some long term members and some newly joined. We also had some representation from those who have taken on running the village hall- without which the society would find it near impossible to continue. So, thanks to all those who came, even those who turned up a mere twenty four hours late because that gave Sarah and me the excuse to open another bottle of wine.

Some concern has been raised about the status of Manor Farm House given the plan to construct more houses to the south of it. The society did, therefore, raise a case to put the building on the locally listed register. The Borough Council came back and said that they had no resources to do this, but that its location in the Conservation Area would give it adequate protection. So I took the name of the member of planning who called and said that if anything did go wrong he could take the can rather than me. I do actually believe that the farm house is not under threat. We know that it appears to have been built in 1776 from a date carved in the roof beams, which should ensure that the conservation area protection is strong. It is a pity that it is no longer a working farm and one can no longer go to Mrs Davies for milk but it is very central to the history of the village.

Our September talk took us to Tewkesbury Abbey, where for over ten years now, they have had resident peregrine falcons. David Bagely is a bell ringer there and “acquired” the falcons by accident. That is to say, they just turned up! Since then, he has had a steep learning curve in finding out how to keep them as comfortable as is possible to be, if you insist on nesting on a gravel platform on the side of a high nine-hundred year-old tower. Over the years Christopher Robin, the male falcon, and his several mates have raised a number of offspring who have fledged, although quite a few did not make it. They have also reduced the feral pigeon population of Tewkesbury by some hundred- although I have never noticed any great shortage myself. The shots of the birds nesting, producing eggs and living the high life were excellent. The problem now will be walking past the tower without constantly looking up thereby imperilling other walkers and hopefully not being hit by a bus.

One side matter that David mentioned is that Cheltenham's own Christ Church has a falcon population too, and that it is possibly the most successful in the country given the number of young that have fledged. But then I have never noticed any shortage of feral pigeons around there either.

In October, Julie Hodsdon will tell us about Pittville Park and the Friends of Pittville. In November Peter Gill will tell us about Cheltenham in the War. Whether this includes Swindon Village's contribution as a transit camp, prisoner of war camp and occasional target I don't know.

## **Church Cake Sale Mystery- solved!**

In the last edition of our newsletter, R. Hudson sent out a plea asking for the recipe for the “cheesy balls of gorgeousness” that were offered up at the cake and plant sale at St Lawrence Church over the summer. And her plea has been answered!

Thanks go to Ludmilla Cintra who wrote to us to inform us that these delicacies are in fact a traditional Brazilian recipe. She has kindly furnished us with the recipe, as well as some top-tips for making them.

Brazilian Cheese Bread:

### **Ingredients:**

4 cups of sour starch

1/2 cup of warm water

1 tablespoon (dessert) of salt

1 cup of milk

1 cup of oil

2 eggs

2 cups of grated half-cured cheese (here I suggest parmesan or Grana pagano or a mix of both in substitution).

### **Method:**

In a container (bowl) place the powder and warm water.

Mix with your hands.

Add salt, stir and set aside.

Heat the milk and oil to a boil.

After bringing to the boil, pour over the reserved powder.

Mix to clump together.

Add the eggs and keep stirring.

Add the grated half-cured cheese.

Knead the dough onto a smooth surface.

Then grease your hands with oil and roll up small balls.

Place them on a greased and sprinkled baking sheet (or use baker paper).

Bake in a preheated 180° degree oven for more about than 15 to 20 minutes.

Tip: If desired, fill with pepperoni sausage or mozzarella.

\*May be frozen before baking

**Top-tips:**

You can find sour starch on Amazon. I have seen the Brazilian sour starch there as well (it's called "polvilho azedo"). It's made from kasava (mandioca in Portuguese).

There are also videos on YouTube ( in English) showing how you could make the recipe.
