

In mid November I was having to think about what I wanted to say regarding Christmas. Now I'm rounding up some Christmas topics in a piece that you won't see until February!

Back in June (blimey!) we made ex-Chair of the Parish Council, Peter Allen, a Freeman of the Parish. Peter has served the community for many years and is only the second person to receive this accolade. In early December we invited Peter and Eileen to a dinner to round off the year and presented him with his certificate.



The presentation was made by Councillor James Cornish, our new Chair. Well done and thank you to Peter. Peter is an authority on planning matters and we hope he will continue to offer us advice and guidance.



Every year Karen invites the Parish Council to enter the annual Christmas Tree Festival. We always have the best of intentions but somehow never get round to actually doing it.

This year we were delighted to receive an offer of help from Steph and her son Ethan. They produced a wonderful Christmas tree for us. Thank you so much.

A huge thank you to Ian Brown, our volunteer allotments manager, for collecting the allotment rents and generally looking after the running of the allotments on our behalf. The income is important to the Parish Council and enables us to keep our precept (and your council tax) as low as possible. I'm not sure how the allotment holders (or their crops) are coping with global warming. We seem to have record breaking warm weather followed by record breaking wet weather!

Speaking of the precept, the Parish Council has now set its budget for 2023-2024. We plan to spend £17,677. To keep costs to parishioners as low as we can we plan to collect £12,175 via council tax (33p per week for a household in council tax band D) and make up the remaining £5,501 by drawing on reserves.

Setting the precept requires a lot of thought. We want to collect enough money to address local issues and to help local people. However, we recognise that these are hard times for many people.





We did what we could to help people during the pandemic and now, with the increasing cost of living, we know that food banks are operating locally. There is one operating at the school.


Anyone can use it, not just parents of pupils. Simply buzz at the gate to enter between 3:30 and 4:30pm on school days to take what you need or to donate what you can spare.

We should be proud that we live in a community that looks after its own, and the Parish Council is determined to play a full part in that whilst keeping its costs as low as possible.

I have previously reported that we were investigating the provision of a warm space for local folk to meet during the day for tea or coffee and companionship during the toughest winter months. Sadly we have not been able to identify a suitable venue. The church is very difficult to get warm, the Village Hall is already in use during the day and the Cross Hands has been unresponsive. We have struck out on this one but we did our best. Thank you James for trying.



Back to the Christmas theme- and Alison, our newest councillor, is now our volunteer snow warden. Her friends decided to recognise this with a very appropriate item of Personal Protective Equipment. Alison is also our flood warden. Perhaps we should get her a wetsuit? Most people take a step back when volunteers are being sought- not Alison!

Thinking further ahead, we are starting to plan for the Annual Parish Meeting. There is an advertisement for it elsewhere in this issue. Please save the date (26th April) and come and meet us! In requesting the date I was told that it would have been a Wine Club night but that the club had folded. Another "institution" going the way of the WI, the Youth Club, the Wednesday Club and others.



There is now a bookcase in the bus shelter in Quat Goose Lane. People can leave books, take books and exchange books. It is all very informal. This was an initiative from Karren, who has been "hosting" a bookcase outside her house. The weather was getting the better of it (and the books). We'll see how this works. We have Joan to thank for obtaining the bookcase and Karren's husband Matt for fitting it.


There is another one in the Village Hall, so get reading!

I've been giving you lots of positive messages so far but I'm going to have to throw in a negative one sadly. We have had another example of fly tipping.

If you see anyone doing this please report them. Even better, take photographs (without placing yourself at risk). How can these people (and the irresponsible dog owners) look at themselves in the mirror?

Also, we are continuing to see lots of discarded nitrous oxide "laughing gas" capsules that are used recreationally. It is not illegal to possess the gas but it is illegal for it to be sold to persons under the age of 18. At the very least discarding these containers in the street and in the countryside is an offence and anyone doing this should be reported to the police.






I seem to have drifted away from the Christmas theme so let's get back to it.

By the time you read this, we will have held our AGM, but as I write this we have not. However, I am prepared to make some predictions. The committee will be re-elected unopposed including the poor, long suffering Chairman. With luck, no one will have raised the matter of his title and whether he should now be referred to the Chairperson, the Chair or, indeed, the Chairthingy; but you never know.

The big thing is that we are still going- which given the demise of several local societies or other forums since the lockdown is good news.

We have a full programme for the year including talks on: 'The Birds of Gloucestershire'; 'H H Martyn' the very important local industrialist; 'Building a Medieval Cathedral' which may come in handy given the size of the proposed new local developments; 'The Severn Bore', the one on the river – not me; 'The Gloucestershire Regiment at the Imjin River' a very important battle in the Korean War and 'Pilgrims and Pilgrimages in Gloucestershire' which may explain the ancient carving on the entrance to St Lawrence's Church. There will also be a guided walk around Painswick; a visit to a local garden and the (in)famous August Garden Party.


In fact it is worth expanding a bit on the H H Martyn talk in March. Martyn's and Co was once the largest employer in this area. They made many fittings for the great ocean liners of the time such as The Queens Mary and Elizabeth, decorations and fittings in Parliament including the Speaker's chair and ending



up being joint founders of the Dowty Company and the Gloster Aviation Company which made many great aircraft including Britain's first jet aircraft which was built where the Regent's Arcade now stands. It should make for a fascinating talk.

Since this is the first article of 2023, I will now repeat a paragraph for my last input just in case you were not paying attention. For those of you who do not really know what the Society is about, our main interest is in keeping Swindon Village a reasonable place to live. We are not against development; we just want it to take place without adversely impinging on the lives of those of us who already live here. To that end, knowledge of local history and local wildlife can be very useful in ameliorating some of the dafter ideas put forward by developers. So do think of coming to join us. The lockdowns have taken a toll on the number of members we have, speakers seem to be increasing their costs in line with inflation rates in Turkey and no doubt the Village Hall will need to make some increases to cover heating costs. New members are always welcome; you don't have to turn up to anything except the Garden Party where we are considering a three line whip but it is great if you do come. The price is worth it for the post-talk tea and chat alone.

Chicken, Salami and Mozzarella Bake

(Serves 4)

Ingredients:	J :
1 ball of Mozzarella (or equivalent in grated)	The second second
4 Boneless Chicken Thighs	
Thin sliced Salami (about ¾ of a packet)	
Veg of your choosing – I like courgettes, carrots	s, mushrooms,
peppers, onions,celery and olives	
1 carton of Passata	
Tomato puree	
Crushed Garlic	
Chilli (optional)	
Herbs – I like oregano, basil, thyme and rosemond	ary but mixed
herbs does the same job	

This can be served with rice, pasta or gnocchi (I like gnocchi best)

Method:

1. Cut up the hard veggies you have, onions, celery and carrots with the garlic and chilli and add them to a frying pan with oil and cook for a couple of minutes.

2. Cut up the chicken into bite sized pieces and add to the pan until mostly cooked through.

3. Add the rest of your cut vegetables and cook for a further five minutes.





4. Add the passata and about a tablespoon for tomato puree to the pan, rinse out the passata carton with a little water and add this too.

5. Add all your desired herbs and salt and pepper to taste.

6. Cut your salami into quarters but save four slices to the side.

7. Add the quarters of salami to the sauce and leave to simmer for about 10 minutes.

8. If using pasta or gnocchi, cook it mostly and add it to an oven proof dish with the sauce and mix together. If serving with rice just add the sauce to the dish and cook the rice separately.

9. On top layer the remaining salami chopped in half and break up the ball of mozzarella over the top.

10. Cook in the oven at 180 degrees for around 30 minutes, or more depending how crispy you'd like the top.
