There are many people behind the scenes who make all of these things possible. People often say to me "I don't know how you do it all" and my point is that I don't!






SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

We have had two major planning applications to consider recently; the proposal for a telecoms mast to be built at the junction of Rivelands Road and Church Road, and the proposal for 180 homes to be built at Home Farm, Quat Goose Lane.

The principle of these developments is a done deal. The government is keen to extend high speed broadband access as a means of boosting the economy. We can't argue against the principle of these aerials being installed, but we can argue against their location.





It would be difficult to pick a more inappropriate location for a tall aerial and its associated equipment. In total 113 comments were made to the Borough Council. The Planning Officer agreed and the application was refused. The Planning Officer stated that "The proposed mast, by reason of its size, siting and appearance, would have a detrimental impact on the design and character of the area, including that of the Swindon Village Conservation Area".

The Parish Council would welcome the opportunity to discuss with the developer the siting of an aerial that meets the technical constraints in terms of coverage whilst also being sensitive to the character and visual amenity of the area.

Similarly, despite much opposition, the Joint Core Strategy (JCS) is now in place and allocates areas of land for housing in the Cheltenham/Gloucester/Tewkesbury areas. The Home Farm outline planning application is part of the broader Elms Park/North West Urban Extension detailed in the JCS. Again, the principle of development is established. However, any development must take account of factors including traffic, education, the environment, etc.

The proposals for the development at Home Farm generated a huge amount of concern locally. As I write 225 comments have been registered on the Borough Council planning portal. I know that some residents (and one of our Borough Councillors!) struggled to register their comments on the portal. The Borough Council has suggested that the sheer volume of comments has crashed the system! For future reference the Borough Council has advised me that comments can also be submitted via email to either "dccomments@cheltenham.gov.uk" or "planning.comments@cheltenham.gov.uk".





The Parish Council registered a number of concerns, one of the principal ones being the plans (or lack of them) for dealing with the traffic the new development will generate. In the outline planning application that has been submitted the intention is to route this traffic through Quat Goose Lane.

This planning application should be compliant with the JCS but the proposed arrangements for the increased traffic are completely at odds with it. This has also been recognised and commented upon by National Highways and by our Borough and County Councillors.

I have been advised that the Government's new Emergency Alerts system is now live, and many of you should have received a test message on 23rd April. The system will be used to warn people when lives are in danger.Emergency Alerts are sent to compatible



mobile phones within an area of risk. They don't track your location, need your phone number, or collect personal data, and only the emergency services can send them. You can check an alert is genuine at gov.uk/alerts. An Emergency Alert is a loud, siren-like sound with a message on your screen. Find out more at gov.uk/alerts.

The system was tested in East Suffolk and Reading. Hard to understand how my wife's phone kept getting them then...

We are aware that there have been tree issues in the Amenity Area (behind Manor Court). Rather than address issues on an ad hoc basis we are intending to put in place a plan to actively manage the Amenity Area, including the stream and the trees.

The layers of fibre cabling have continued to enrage local residents. Roads and paths seem to be closed without any notice or the proper authority and trenches are left unguarded. The area in front of the noticeboard by the Cross Hands was actually cordoned off when I was trying to post notices. At the time the cable laying team was meeting with the big boss. Everyone was staring down into the trench and deep in melancholy discussion. Not wishing to distract them I slipped in behind them to put my agenda on the noticeboard. Eventually I was spotted and all hell broke loose. Given the apparently tenuous adherence to health and safety best practice I was amazed by the consternation that I invoked. The immediate concern appeared to be that the 18 inch deep 12 inch wide trench (45cm by 30cm for our younger readers) represented an immediate danger to my life. Between you and me I think attitudes were tempered by the presence of the big boss.



On a personal note if I may I would like to thank my Parish Council colleagues and our friends and neighbours and for all their understanding and support during a period of ill health in the family. If this sentence causes my piece to cross a page boundary I'll pay for advertising space. And if you run a local business that is what you should be doing!


Councillor Alison Berry




Community Connexions is a local community transport organisation. We help many local residents by providing transport vital for helping people retain their independence and tackle loneliness from social and rural isolation.

On the 6th May, the coronation of the new King shall occur at Westminster Abbey. This month, all of the questions relate to the history of this important ceremony. **Good luck!**

1. The King and Queen consort will arrive at Westminster Abbey after a procession that begins at which royal palace?

2. During the ceremony, the King will sit and be crowned in the "coronation chair". Which King is this named after, he commissioned the chair in 1300-1301.

3. Sometimes called "Jacob's Pillow" or "The Tanist Stone", what object was stolen from a ruined abbey near Perth in 1296? It is now kept with the Scottish crown jewels when not used in coronation events.

4. Traditionally, the ceremony is held in a mixture of two languages. English is one, what is the other?

5. Westminster Abbey has been the venue for all coronations since 1066, with one exception. Henry III was crowned at which cathedral in 1216, it was then called St. Peter's Abbey?

6. The coronation in 1689 was a very unusual occasion, as it was and remains the only coronation when two joint monarch were crowned, who were they?

7. Although coronations are usually grand affairs, what was the reginal number of William, who was crowned in 1831, was nicknamed the "penny King" due to the frugality of his event, which finished without the traditional banquet?





8. Two Kings of England never had a coronation. One was Edward V one of the "princes in the tower" who may have been killed before he could be crowned. The other abdicated before he could be crowned in ceremony, what was his name?

9. The regalia for the ceremony had to be re-made for the coronation of Charles II, after the original regalia was destroyed in which war of the 1600s?

10. Every coronation since George III has featured a piece of music called "Zadok the Priest", created by which famous German composer?

Philippa blazes a trail in Paris Part 2

I hope you all enjoyed last month's article about Philippa and her wonderful wheelchair rugby. I inadvertently omitted the photo showing her in action defending the ball in the gold medal match. I apologise profusely and hopefully late is better than never so here it is...





In March, James Rendell came to tell us about H H Martyn, a remarkable man and a remarkable firm. The man came from the humblest origins. He was born in 1842 into a very working class family in Worcester. At 14, he was apprenticed to a picture frame maker. Later, he studied at the School of Design in London where he became a journeyman architectural carver, earning 7 shillings a week. Soon, he moved to a firm in Worcester carrying out restoration work on Worcester Cathedral and when that firm moved to Cheltenham he moved with them. He then set up as a freelance carver in wood and stone and worked on many local churches. In 1888 he formed H H Martyn and Co as an association of craftsmen. Finally, in 1900, together with his son, the firm became a private limited company which undertook cabinet making, wrought iron work and making small objects in bronze and gunmetal, plasterwork and joinery. By 1909 the firm employed 200 craftsmen and they undertook work fitting out ocean liners such as P & O's Queens and they also undertook work in Buckingham Palace and the Houses of Parliament including making the Speaker's Chair.

Because of their woodworking skills, in the First World War they were contracted to make aircraft fuselages and in 1917 established the Gloster Aircraft Company in a 50/50 venture with Airco of Hendon. At first they made the aircraft in Cheltenham, either in a factory at Sunningend near the railway station which can still be seen, and also in the Winter Gardens glasshouse which stood in what is now Imperial Gardens in town. Later Gloster's bought Hucclecote airfield and moved manufacturing there. At the start of the Second World War, the firm created a large new factory on the other side of the airfield and changed its name to Brockworth. In the first year of the war, they built one-thousand Hawker Hurricane fighters and later three-thousand three-hundred Hawker Typhoons.



While doing this, they also made Britain's first jet aircraft, the Gloster E28/39 at Regents Garage in the middle of town. This was then taken to Brockworth for taxi trials and actually became airborne for three hundred yards on one of these tests. Its first official flight was made later at RAF Cranwell in Lincolnshire but Britain's first actual jet flight really took place just down the road from here.

Gloster's also spawned several other local aircraft firms such as Dowty's but finally closed in 1984 when along with most other British aircraft firms it was amalgamated into British Aerospace. For many years H H Martyns and its offshoots were the biggest employers in the area. Not bad for a chap who rose from almost nowhere.



Aubergine Lasagna (Serves 4/5)

Ingredients.

- 3 small/regular aubergines or equivalent
- Lasagna sheets
- Carton of passata
- 100g of cheddar cheese
- 50g butter
- 4tbsp plain flour
- 500ml milk
- 1 clove of garlic
- Herbs I use basil, oregano, chili, rosemary and thyme
- Olive oil

Method:

1.Preheat the oven to 180 degrees.

2.Cut the aubergines into 1cm rounds and lay them flat in an oiled baking tray and season with salt and pepper.

3.Cook in the oven for 15 minutes, turning them over half-way through.

4.Add the passata (rinse the carton and add some water too), herbs and chopped garlic to a saucepan season generously with salt and pepper and heat until hot.

5.Next make the cheese sauce. Add the butter, flour and milk to a saucepan and heat it up while whisking continuously. The butter will melt, the milk with heat, the flour will disappear, and the sauce will thicken – and your arm will ache!

6. Add in the cheese, season with salt and pepper, delicate on the salt as the cheese is salty and keep whisking – maybe switch arms just to even out the muscle growth!





7. Time to assemble the lasagna! Find an oven-proof dish, roughly20cm squared or equivalent.

8. First put a layer of aubergines, then a layer of lasagna sheets, then enough passata to cover the pasta, finally the cheese sauce on top.

9. Repeat step 8 until you run out of aubergines – I normally have 3 layers – it looks very aesthetically pleasing it the final layer of cheese sauce is solid so you can't see the passata.

10.Add some extra cheese on top, measure with your heart.

6.Bake in the oven for at least 25 minutes, I normally do between 30 and 40 for an extra crispy top!

11.Enjoy!




