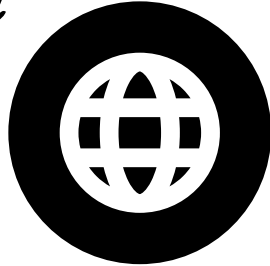

SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on 26th April and, certainly from the point of view of the Parish Councillors, was a great success. Pizza was on offer, with tea and coffee supplied by Sharon and the team. Lisa chaired the meeting and summarised the successes (and frustrations) of the Parish Council's year. I lulled everyone to sleep talking about our finances before Helen brought the house down describing the significant planning applications that we have been reviewing.

It was great to welcome Flo Clucas, one of our Borough Councillors, to the meeting. Flo emphasised how important it had been that the community had responded to the recent planning applications. The planning application for 180 homes at Home Farm was to be dealt with under delegated powers. "Delegated powers" means that the Borough Council planning officer assigned the planning application is left to make the decision. Thanks to our Borough Councillors, the application has now been referred to the Borough Council planning committee. People have the right to speak at planning committee meetings, whether for or against an application. The Parish Council has registered its desire to be represented at the meeting and to speak in opposition to the current plans. It is likely to be late summer before the application comes before the committee. It is interesting to see that comments on the application from Gloucestershire Highways have been added to the Borough Council planning portal. The comments echo our concerns about the unsuitability of the proposed traffic arrangements, so fingers crossed!

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council took place on the 15th May. We are required to hold a meeting in May and the meeting must elect a Chair for the year. The meeting unanimously re-elected Cllr. Cornish as Chair and Cllr. Whitaker as Vice Chair. Thank you to them for taking on the roles.

I have started to flesh out our plans for the Amenity Area. In the course of this I discovered that the River Swilgate which runs through the area is classed as a "main river". As such it falls under the jurisdiction of the Environment Agency rather than the Borough Council. Depending on the work we wish to do we may need to apply for a permit. Nobody said it would be easy!

The Boundary Commission has undertaken a review of the Borough Council ward boundaries. They look at how many residents each Borough Councillor represents and try to keep the numbers relatively even. With the new housing that will be built the number of residents in our area will increase. The Boundary Commission has concluded that the best way to resolve this will be to move the part of Swindon parish that is south of the Tewkesbury Road into the Springbank ward. The folk living south of the Tewkesbury Road will still belong to Swindon Parish (the parish boundary will not change) but the parish will be split into two wards; north and south. Prospective parish councillors will stand in one of the wards and the residents of each ward will only be able to vote for candidates standing in their ward. Don't worry, we have until our next local government elections in 2026 to get our heads around this!

Although it is outside our parish I think the cycle path that (ultimately) will join Cheltenham to Bishops Cleeve may be of interest. It is described as an extension of the Honeybourne Line.

I think that is a misnomer. It is actually a diversion from the Honeybourne Line.



The route goes along Folly Lane, Hudson Street, Marle Hill Road, Wellesley Road and Central Cross Drive before joining the Evesham Road and thence to the Racecourse Roundabout. My (obvious) question is “Why can’t the cycle path continue the Honeybourne Line to Swindon Lane and go up to the Racecourse Roundabout from there?”. It would have been great for residents of Swindon, Prestbury and Wymans Brook to be able to cycle or walk from Swindon Lane into town along a segregated, mainly rural route. There is a consultation in progress ([link on our website](#)). I have made my feelings known and would encourage others to do the same.

Lynne, our newest councillor, was “encouraged” to do some checks on our financial records. The members who didn’t want to do it (which was everybody else) thought it would be a good introduction for Lynne. It turns out Lynne is no stranger to accounts and we are grateful to her for examining a sample of my records. Nothing untoward was found!

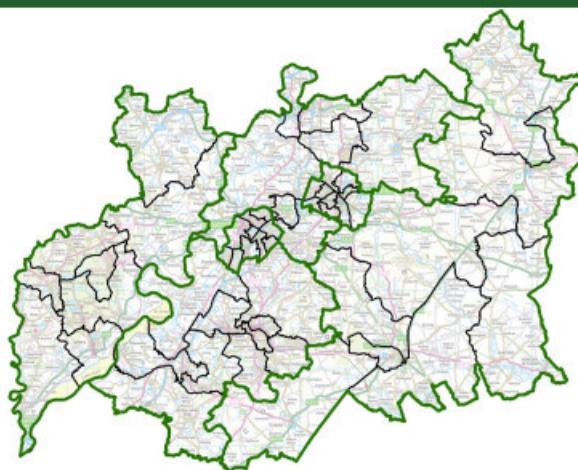

Being endlessly fascinated by peoples' lives can get you into trouble. During my first week as a rector, I asked a quite old man if he had lived here all his life? He gave me a firm stare. "I'm not dead yet" was his quite reasonable reply. Knowing he was from a local family, I asked him about his childhood and school. I wonder if you can remember your first day at school? Did you think: if only I could just run back home and stop it all from happening. The man I was speaking to, he'd be taken each morning down the road to school, only to run home again and be back in front of the fire before his mother put her key in the door. Maybe, we all wish we could just go home again.

When clergy baptise babies, we tend to think of them having no worries, not having to think ahead to what tomorrow might bring. It's a feeling of wishing that we too, had no worries. And that anxiety never quite leaves us. International athletes, medal bedecked Olympic swimmers who every time they line up on track or poolside never think: 'I am going to run or swim well today', but: 'I wish I was home, with my mother and father.'

Do you remember your children's first day at school? Perhaps you would have loved to turn around and protect, insulate and take home each of your children that September day.

There was no way that God could not risk His Son. There was a world to win, a mission to make and the glory of God to be revealed. And lives are lit up, healing hurries to many, God is grafted into people's hearts.

But how might we understand this Father and Son connection? The beautiful thing about us is that we share in God's nature. The great mystic, Julian of Norwich, wrote, 'the place which Jesus takes in our soul is his home of homes – and his greatest delight is to dwell there'. This

might seem bewildering, but Julian keeps us grounded, living in a small room on a busy Norwich thoroughfare. Julian grounds this by talking about something everyone would know about: namely knitting, from the Old English, *cnyttan*, meaning to tie in a knot. Adding that 'your beloved soul was preciousy knitted to God by a knot so subtle and so mighty that it is one in God.' And here is that 'oneing' at work.

One man's father is in a nursing home. The afternoon sun shines into the room, dancing through outside tree branches like fire on the far bedroom wall. You notice the radiance of the father's skin as he watches his son. This is a gentle saying goodbye although no words are said. The son's memory went back to his first day at school, the firm but gentle push of his father's hand between his shoulder blades to push him towards the life that awaited him. He thought that he could feel Jesus by the school gate, and he was pushing his son towards him. And Jesus said to him: Don't worry, I will protect you and him always. I am with you, to the end of time.

April saw twenty members off to Painswick for a guided tour led by John Heathcott. I thought I knew Painswick, a pleasant Cotswold Town with not much happening but a good place from which to start a country walk and known mostly for the ninety nine yews in the church yard. Within ten minutes of starting we realised there was quite a bit more. Only a hundred yards off the road I have driven through fifty times, and quite unbeknownst to me, is the oldest bowling green in Britain; first bowled on in 1554. Once away from that and as your eye adjusts you really start to notice the architecture with some very fine houses on the main road and then more and more as you investigate the side roads.

The thing is, Painswick was really big on wool and cloth, and it was from this that the money flowed. The merchants of the seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth centuries prospered and used the money to build fine homes and fine workplaces. In the end, with mechanisation the cloth industry moved away to Stroud and the big mills there but the buildings remain to be admired now. And it is not just the fine housing that intrigue. Sarah's favourite revelation was the Owl Holes. Many buildings in the town were used for the storage of raw materials. Mice like that kind of stuff and were happy to make their homes there. The answer was to provide the buildings with holes in the walls just the right size for an owl to enter and feast on the dear little rodents below. Good planning and you didn't even have to ask permission of the Council or the town cat.

The town also has a plethora of smaller houses and workplaces which since they are mostly of stone are pleasing to the eye and often have those little quirks of architecture that need to be noticed.

The church is fine and the churchyard with its yews very fine. We did not stop to count yews, but there are very many impressive graves and monuments to commemorate those who once provided the money to build such a fine place. Great visit: thanks John.

And now to the matter of our garden visit in June. We are going to a garden on the hillside below Cleeve Cloud called Westaway. They are not able to accept us on our usual Wednesday date so the visit has been changed to the evening of Monday 19 th June. Tea and buns will be provided after we have looked around. Cost of the visit is £5 including tea. We will leave from the Village Hall car park at 6.30pm and it should take about ten minutes to get there. Numbers are limited to thirty but we are happy to take non members if numbers allow. We will offer lifts if possible. 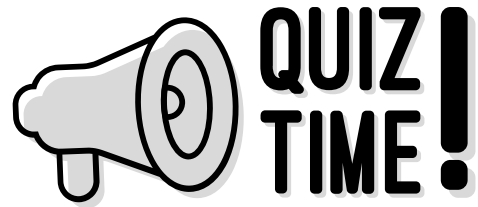

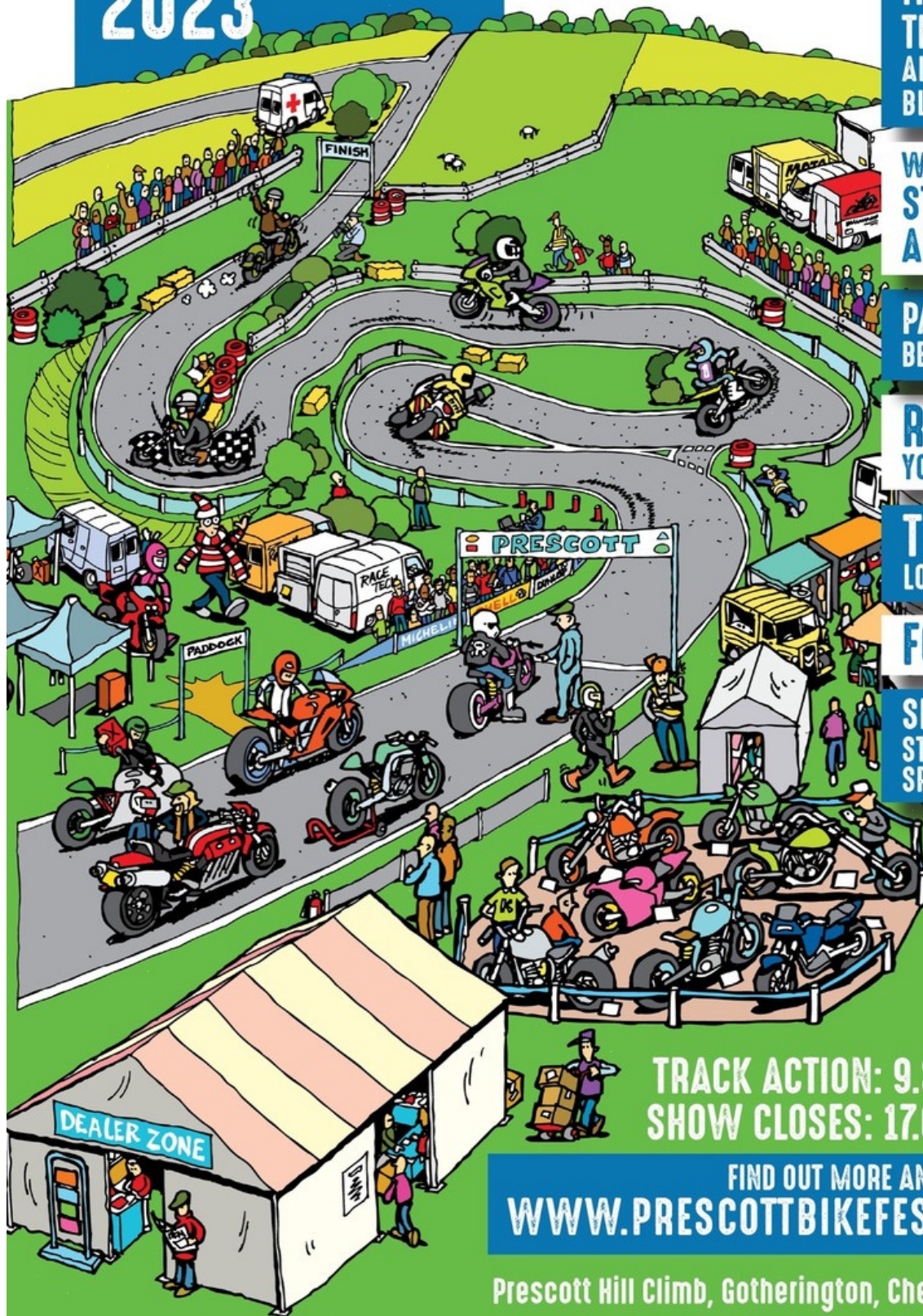

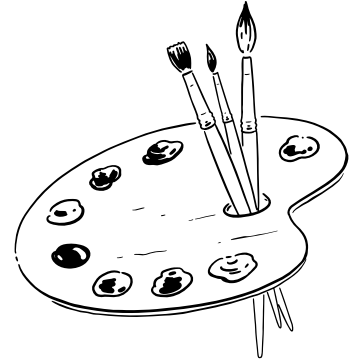

Bekah's Bites

Tarka Dahl

Serves 2 as a full meal/4 as a side.

Ingredients:

- v 200g red lentils**
- v 2 tbsp vegetable oil**
- v 1 onion – finely chopped**
- v 3 cloves garlic – finely chopped**
- v ¼ turmeric**
- v ½ garam masala**



Method:

- 1. Rinse the lentils under the tap under the water runs clear.**
- 2. Simmer the lentils in a pan with 1 litre of water and some salt for 25 minutes, skimming the froth off the top.**
- 3. Heat the oil and cook the onions and garlic for 8 minutes until softened, then add the garam masala and turmeric and mix.**
- 4. Add the spiced onion and garlic into the lentils.**
- 5. Cover the pan with a lid and cook for a further 40 minutes, stirring occasionally until it's a thick soupy consistency – it may take less than 40 minutes.**
- 6. Enjoy – serve with rice or naan bread either as a side with another curry or as a main dish!**
