SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

I wrote my last report in mid November and this is going out to you at the start of February. Something happened between those two events. Umm, oh yes, Christmas and New Year! As this is my first and only opportunity to say it to you, Happy New Year!

In planning, new documents were released by the prospective developer of Home Farm. The documents arrived on 13th December. With only 21 days allowed for review and comment this presented great difficulties for people who were hoping to enjoy some time off during the Christmas holiday. An attempt to avoid close scrutiny? Perhaps we are too cynical.

The documents were mainly a response to comments on highways matters. Originally it was proposed that traffic in and out of Home Farm would use the roads through the coming Elms Park development. With outline permission for Elms Park still pending the developers are trying to argue that the existing roads are adequate to support both construction and residential traffic. The Parish Council is absolutely opposed to this. Can you imagine Quat Goose Lane and Brockhampton Lane being used in this way? Your councillors worked hard in the run up to Christmas drafting comments and producing a leaflet outlining the council's concerns. They personally distributed the leaflet to the homes that would be most affected. As a result of raised public awareness many more comments were submitted to the Borough Council.

Continuing with planning matters, the Parish Council is gearing up to get involved in consultation on the Strategic and Local Plan. This document will replace the infamous Joint Core Strategy (JCS) and the Cheltenham Local Plan.

The Local Green Space that we won through a prolonged argument with the planning authority and planning inspector will again be called into question. If we value where we live we must be prepared to fight to defend it. This process will take years and I'm afraid you'll be hearing more about it from me as time goes by.

Brilliant work!

"I can at last stop talking about the chestnut trees in the Amenity Area. Work has been completed with one tree felled and the other reduced. We are going to seek a better name for the Amenity Area. Ironically I discovered that it used to be called The Chestnuts" on the day I had one of them felled. More works are planned for the area. I have received quotes and am waiting for the Borough Council tree officer to give the go ahead.

I was chatting to a tree surgeon in the Amenity Area in early December. It was windy and we joked that it would probably be best if we didn't stand under some of the trees. I was walking back along Church Road and a branch crashed down from one of the trees, narrowly missing



me. I hope the parish would have taken care of my widow.Our litter pickers were out in force on Sunday 7th January. After the New Year race meeting there was certainly a lot to pick up! We started at the Village Hall. One group headed west and another east. I haven't seen any of the westerlies since. Perhaps they are still out there somewhere! We have set new litter pick dates. They are on the website and on the Village News calendar page. The new faces that joined us last time seemed to enjoy their hour with us!

The allotments holders recently held a meeting to discuss various issues of common interest. The good news is that the badgers have moved on; the bad news is that the deer have moved in. Thank you to Ian for all he did for the allotment holders and the Council and thank you too to Chaz, wonderfully assisted by Gill, for taking on the role.

The Parish Council has set its budget for 2024-2025. We believe in transparency. The Parish Council chair James has written a piece elsewhere in this issue to tell you our thinking.

As you probably know I live next to the railway. The only trainless days (other than strike days) are Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Ironically, the level crossing broke down on Christmas Day. The crossing was showing red flashing lights to the traffic but the gates were stuck in the "up" position. Swindon Parish Council 2024/2025 Budget

A question that I know you've all be asking lately: how does the Parish Council get its money? Seriously if you have been, drop me an email; you should be a parish councillor! Well, like every level of government, you, the taxpayers provide most of the Council's funding. For Parish Councils this is done via a mechanism called the precept. The precept is the amount of money that Cheltenham Borough Council pays the Parish Council each year to fund our activities and is paid for through Council Tax. For the current tax year, a Band D property in Swindon Parish paid a total of £2,066.85 in council tax, of which £17.21 went to the Parish Council. The total precept for 2023/24 is £12,175.58.

Over the past several years we have all been impacted by uncertain economic times, first with the pandemic and more recently high inflation. As such, for several years the Parish Council has made a conscious decision to freeze the precept. We believe this has been the right thing to do. We are fortunate that we have had sufficient reserves, along with underspend on several projects to do this. We hope this has provided you with some small relief.

This year we will (hopefully!) see the purchase of the Village Hall Car Park finalised. We are buying the car park from Cheltenham Borough Council to secure its long-term future, ensuring it remains free to use by all users of the park and village hall. We believe this is important, especially given the congestion and safety issues during school drop-off and pick-up along Church Road.



While we have secured a grant that will fund the actual purchase, the car park will need maintaining and improving. This could include things like new automatic gates, crossings, re-painting, resurfacing, and maintaining vegetation and trees. We have been provided professional advice that over the next decade this could cost up to £80,000. This is what is behind the rise: we need to ensure the Parish Council remains in a sufficiently robust financial footing to be able to maintain and improve the car park.

For our 2024/25 budget we have allocated funding for lots of exciting projects including: a big summer celebration, redevelopment of sundial in the park, and improvement of the park & play area. Our next meeting is on Monday 12th February 2024, 7:30PM at Swindon Village Hall. We would love to hear from you.

<u>Licensing service for Revd. Jacqueline Henson</u>



Dauphinoise Potatoes

Creamy, garlicky potatoes that boost any roast dinner. Good to cook in batch then portion into dishes and freeze.

Ingredients:

- Onion
- Bag of potatoes
- 600ml double cream
- 1 pint of full fat milk
- 1 tablespoon of salt
- 2-6 cloves of garlic
- Butter

Method:

- 1. Peel the onion, leave whole and add to a sauce pan.
- 2. Slice the potatoes into rounds just thinner than 1cm and add to the saucepan.
- 3. Crush the garlic and add to the saucepan along with the salt, milk and cream.
- 4. Bring to a boil then a simmer and cook with a lid on for 20 minutes.
- 5. Add the potatoes in layers to a buttered dish, pouring the creamy liquid over the top, then dot the top with little pieces of butter.
- 6. If cooking straight away, cook in a 220 degree oven for 20 mins. If cooking later, cook for 30/40 mins.



Happy new year all! If you're anything like me, over winter you've been having ideas in your head for what to do to your garden in Spring and beyond.

I think Winter is an important time for reflection as a gardener and as such I think I should share some of my gardening 'failures' last year, as you only ever see the success stories on Gardener's World etc.

Cabbages are notoriously difficult from seed, but I thought 'how hard can they be?'. Turns out, very difficult. 3 out of 12 made it out of my seed tray, then they all died within two weeks. In hindsight, I think this was mainly down to me not having a greenhouse, just a plastic growhouse, meaning they didn't get the warmth and light they need early on to develop a strong root system. Only attempt with very low expectation!

Swede was better but rather comical. I grew three under a cloche from June, harvested in early December after some frosts, but they were small, very small. All three were only enough for two small portions, the wife said it was the best swede she's ever had, but had to laugh as she was wanting more! Again, I can only think they didn't get enough light, in shade half the day and behind my very tall sprouts when the morning sun was out.

There's a common theme with the above, Winter Veg is more difficult, but none the less, I was very pleased to have our homegrown potatoes (kept in blackout storage bags since August) and sprouts to eat over the Christmas period. If I could only recommend one vegetable to grow your own this year, it'd be potatoes, they're so easy to grow, even in pots, and taste amazing home-grown.

And now for something completely different. As a resident of St Lawrence Court, a now 3 year old 'new' estate, myself and other residents want to rework the messy wildflower areas, left by the builders. The small wildflower area some of you know if you walk past Manor Farm (formally Mrs Davis') down the nature path, is pictured below. Initial ideas are to transform it into a flower/insect friendly area, with a small path within, that's also child friendly. It's a lot of work for just myself, so in short, if you fancy helping turn it into a beautiful area of the village, bring your gardening gloves (spades would help but not required), on Saturday 2nd March from 1pm. In last month's edition I told you of some of our bookings for next year but as I write this I am stuck for something to write and so you are going to get the same again but with some additions.

In February we will be told the history of cider making in Gloucestershire.

In March it is Votes for Women – the campaign in the Cheltenham Area.

In April we have a talk on the five thousand year old Belas Knapp long barrow and on Humblebee, the nearby wood.

In May John Heathcott will be taking us on a walk around Northleach, a small town with a lot of history and a magnificent church.

The June talk is not yet booked.

In July there will be a garden visit but we need the annual garden visit brochure to be published before we select somewhere suitable.

August is our traditional garden party – lukewarm wine in a drizzle – not to be missed.

In September we are pleased to welcome back Dr Tim Brain. He returns to us to give us his talk on the 2007 water crisis at which time he was Chief Constable. We have had this talk before but the return is because of requests by both those who heard it and those who missed it and heard how good it was. It has the advantage that we were all here for this crisis and were very close to the action.



Then in October, John Dixon, Chairman of Tewkesbury LHS, will tell us the tale of 'Our own Bill Shakespeare, Bathurst and the Band of Tewkesbury Boat Builder' In other words – the history of boat building in Tewkesbury. This talk has been strongly recommended by another local history group.

November's event is not booked as yet – I may have to perform my tap dancing routine again.

Apart from all the talks we have not been inactive on the Nimby (Not In My Back Yard – a title we wear with pride) front this year. We have produced two letters firmly against the early development of Home Farm and the disruption that would cause. We have also written against the erection of the massive communications mast in Rivelands Road and suggested some cheaper and better alternatives. Some of us have also helped a general tidying of the millennial sundial on the playing field including the restoration of the mosaics and the explanatory notice board and also helped the Parish Council with checking local footpaths.

If you are not a member do think of joining us. Our main aim is to keep the village a pleasant place to live and it is most useful when writing a 'snotogram' to the planners to be able to say that we are writing on behalf of 'X' concerned residents. 'X' is currently 82. It would be even better if it were 99.

Annual membership is £10 or £20 for two or a family. And remember the free glass of lukewarm white wine in August!
