SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

I am writing this on my phone in Prague. I daren't let Karren down. Please forgive any faux pas.

The August Parish Council meeting attracted 17 members of the public, a Borough councillor and our County Councillor. We like to think we are a good draw but the real reason? The current traffic conditions in the area and the development plans that will make things so much worse.

The developer proposing to develop the Home Farm site published yet more documents. They covered several topics but, critically, they attempted to argue that the housing at Home Farm could be built and occupied independently of the Elms Park development. To recap, the plan was that the roads through Elms Park phase 3 would provide access to the Home Farm site, both for development traffic and for the new residents. The broader Elms Park scheme has not yet received planning approval. Though the arguments continue to rage, the planners are of the view that M5 Junction 10 will need to be made four way before the area can sustain the increase in traffic.

The government is determined to get houses built. If planning permission for development is refused the developers may well appeal to the Secretary of State and, given the pressing need for more homes, may well be successful.


The Parish Council delivered a robust response to the new documents. Brockhampton Lane and Quat Goose Lane being used by heavy construction vehicles doesn't bear thinking about.

On to Elms Park itself. Swindon Farm is the first part of the broader Elms Park development. I told you how horrified we were to be told that Manor Road was to be closed until late August. Supported by other councillors, James did his best to get the developer to improve on this time. Double the horror then when we heard that the period of the closure was to be extended to the end in October. It is rumoured that a previously undiscovered gas main has been found and has to be diverted. Since this bombshell announcement we have been given a revised date of 6th September. This is later than the original date that caused us so much concern and yet it feels like a victory!

It is proposed that the Elms Park phases be swapped, with the original phase 3 (the land adjacent to Home Farm) being developed in advance of the phase 2 middle section. The Home Farm developer



is likely to argue that this will mean that the poor traffic conditions through Quat Goose Lane, Brockhampton Lane and Dark Lane would only be temporary. However, the development timescale for Elms Park is still unknown. "Temporary" could be literally years.

Last time I mentioned that the Parish Council's plan to purchase the Village Hall car park from the Borough Council had hit a snag. Extensive repairs are required to the sewers. The Parish Council has decided to bite the bullet and to proceed with the purchase. We have secured grant funding for the capital cost and also some of the repairs.

The churchyard at St. Lawrence Church has no more space for new burials. The Parochial Church Council has decided that it no longer has the capacity to maintain the churchyard. In law, responsibility for maintenance can be passed to the Parish Council. The Parish Council would then have three months to decide whether to take on the responsibility or to pass it on to Cheltenham Borough Council. For a small, low spending Parish Council accepting this new obligation would have a huge impact. We are considering the best way forward for the Parish Council, the church and the community.

There are other things going on, but these topics are the "big hitters" that occupy so much of our limited resources. We are delighted then to welcome a new member, Tom Harcourt, to the Parish Council. I'm sure Tom will help us in many ways but his particular interest is in the management and improvement of Old Mill Way. A big thank you to Tom. We still have two vacancies. Snap them up while you can.

A couple of silly headlines for you.

PETITION

Our new Cheltenham Borough Councillor Frank Allen is tackling some of the transport issues leading into and around the Parish.

He has written a petition and needs your help to address the matters with Gloucestershire County Council.

In sum, the petition is calling for Gloucestershire County Council to:

1. Coordinate road closures to occur at different times to reduce cumulative impacts;

2. Expand the bridge connecting Swindon Road to the Kingsditch Estate to ease traffic;

- 3. Promote transparent and clear engagement around road closures;
- 4. Reduce the impact of road closures on pedestrian walkways;

5. Enforce strict adherence from developers and utilities providers to the time frames they have proposed


So far it has 60 signatures, but it would be good to have as many as possible.

In June we had a very interesting talk on Funerary Monuments in Gloucestershire. Now this might sound like a somewhat downbeat subject but it is about the history you can see now. We have many fantastic churches in the area and, as Simon Jenkins says in his book about the thousand best churches in England, they are the museum of the English People. By the monuments there is normally an explanation of who they were, what they achieved and how they affected their world. Within three days of this talk my walking group had visited a church with just such a monument and we all came away with a better idea of time, place and our own history. Visit Churches!

The garden visit in July did finally work out well. We had about twenty folks in the group visit and none had to travel far because we ended up at Swindon Hall after our visit to rather more distant National Garden Scheme garden fell through. Damon in The Lodge showed us his work in progress; a sunken patio with the excavated earth being used to build a small hill for a stream to flow down. This, together with many sunflowers staring at the visiting hoard made for quite an impact. Then on to visit John's rather splendid garden at Fortune Cottage. Then things were rather more free range with the gardens of Numbers 1, 2, 3 and 5 to roam before finishing up at number 3 for a cuppa or a glass of something better for the garden owners. This glass was also offered to Mel in the hope that it would act as an anaesthetic.

Just to add a bit of drama, as people were roaming free including visiting the garden at number 1, a full sized deer, possibly a female Roe, shot out from the far end of the No 1's garden and in trying to escape hit Mel's arm with enough force to give her a considerable bruise.



Fortunately we had two doctors with us who could check it was nothing worse but the anaesthetic provided by a glass of white did seem a good idea. We have never seen a deer in the grounds before. This one shot past me as I was showing folks in through the gate and it was certainly a reasonable sized beast. It headed off into the trees possibly aiming for the Village Hall to see if the bar was open since it probably needed a steadier itself.

Thanks to all those who showed us their gardens. We would not have done nearly so well had the original plan gone ahead.

In September Dr Tim Brain will return to tell us again the tale of Gloucestershire in the 2007 floods. We have had this talk before and it was so well received that I was asked to invite him back by those who missed and by new member. Here again is a part of our history and many of us were involved in or affected by the floods. But there was much more to the event as is revealed in the talk. Strongly recommended and, as ever, visitors will be most welcome.

Finally, I will remind you that we have agreed to include the village in the annual Heritage Open Days programme for the first time in a few years. So on Saturday 14th September we will invite visitors from the area to a talk on 'The History of Swindon Village', in St Lawrence's Church at 2pm. This will be followed by a walk around the village to see our more historic sites. If you are new to the village this is a good time to find out about where you live. Bring your children. The talk and walk will be free but the tea and buns afterwards can be purchased and any profits go to church funds.

RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE

I hope you have had a lovely summer, whether you spent it at home or travelled further afield. It's good to be able to take some time away from the usual routines of life and reflect on what has been going well and what might have been differently.

As we come into a new season, both meteorologically and ecclesiastically, we, as a Church, have been reflecting. The last six months have been a period where my family and I have been settling into a new home and community. I have enjoyed getting to know residents of Swindon Village and leading services in the beautiful church, which is over 1000 years old in parts.

There are always things which can never quite stay the same, however much we would like them to, and in the case of the church at the moment, it is the churchyard. We have a brilliant, enthusiastic group of volunteers who work very hard to maintain the churchyard and keep it looking welcoming for everyone. Unfortunately, after centuries of burials, our relatively small churchyard is nearly at full capacity; practically, we have been unable to accommodate any requests for new burials for a number of years. As a legal formality, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) is now in the process of applying to the Ministry of Justice for permission to permanently close the churchyard for future burials. There will be exceptions, including where anyone has already reserved a plot, and it may also be possible for burials (if there is space) and interment of ashes to take place within existing family graves.

As regards ashes, interments would still continue in our Garden of Remembrance following closure of the churchyard, although the



number of available plots is becoming increasingly limited. You may also be aware that the PCC passed a motion several years ago that for ashes to be interred in the churchyard, the deceased had to be a resident of the parish, have some form of connection with the church (such as being on the church electoral roll) and have had a Christian funeral.

It is a difficult situation and I know this will come as distressing news for residents of the parish who would like to be buried or have their ashes interred at St. Lawrence. Please do contact me if you have any questions about the PCC's application to close the churchyard. And please be assured that I am always available for a conversation with you and your loved ones to discuss expectations and talk through different options.

In the meantime, we are looking forward to a month of new beginnings in our schools, and we have a number of baptisms coming up at St. Lawrence. As we look ahead towards the Harvest Festival, please do come along to a joint service being held at St. Mary Magdalene in Elmstone Hardwicke on Sunday 6 October to celebrate Harvest, which is being led by the Bishop of Tewkesbury, Robert Springett. Any donations of non-perishable goods are very welcome and will be given to the Fresh Hope Community Pantry, based at The Rock in St. Peter's Church on Tewkesbury Road.

So as we face a period of change and fresh starts, I hope that you will experience God's blessing on you in all your endeavours. "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3. 22-23) North Cheltenham Team Ministry

Together @ Ten Thirty on Sunday 1st September



Go grow with Dale

Hello Gardeners, I hope you've all been having a great summer with lots of time in the garden enjoying nature. We particularly enjoy our Anemones this time of year, as they're just coming into flower.

This month I wanted to talk about houseplants with Autumn not far away, in specific, Peace Lilies.

Peace Lillies win the hearts of many as they look beautiful but are also relatively easy to care for, we've found ours are more than happy on a windowsill, even if it only gets a quarter of the days worth of sun.

When you first buy them from the shop though, they're almost certainly already pot bound, so don't buy them based on the nice pot! If you can, get them with a plastic pot that you can easily repot into a bigger plastic pot, then hide the plastic pot inside a nice new ceramic pot, not just a prettier aesthetic, but better drainage as well. This method will slightly raise the soil and roots above the bottom of the ceramic pot. This also applies every two years when your Peace Lilly has likely outgrown its pot, but equally, don't always feel the need to upgrade if you don't want yours any bigger!

Overwatering is the main cause of houseplants dying, so make sure you only water twice a month maximum! It's generally easy to tell when it's time to water your peace lily if you stick your finger 1cm into the surrounding soil and it's bone dry or if the leaves are starting to droop.

It's also worth noting that Peace Lilies are one of the easiest plants to divide, so if you don't want to repot yours into something bigger, it may well be worth taking it out of its pot and gently pulling it in half

with your hands, before repotting back into its original pot with some fresh compost. Maybe pot up the other half as a gift! Top tip though would be to use some horticultural/alpine grit to surround the top of your repotted plants to keep pesty fruit flies away. Two years later you'll likely have the peace lily back to the same size it was.
