

SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Last month I featured the ongoing debate about whether housing could be built at Home Farm, using the Village roads for access. We are delighted to see that Gloucestershire Highways have made their position very clear.

The Highway Authority has undertaken a detailed assessment of the planning application. Based on the analysis of the information submitted the Highway Authority concludes that the use of Swindon Village for general purpose access and construction traffic would not provide safe and suitable access for all users and therefore recommends that this application is refused.

We are delighted that GCC Highways supports the view of the Parish Council and the local residents. We have been subjected to



We have been subjected to continuous disruption from various roadworks in recent months. Manor Road has at last been reopened but with traffic light controls so that work can continue on one carriageway at a time. According to the permit that has been issued this phase should end on 14th November. One of our Parish Councillors has been

told the traffic lights will remain in place for 28 weeks! Church Road was under traffic light control again. We have also had road works in Hayden Road, Tewkesbury Road and Swindon Lane. Our Borough Councillor is seeking a meeting with the appropriate authorities to see if better coordination is possible.

We haven't had any problems with travellers in recent times, but they did attempt to break into the park on the night of 16th August. Thankfully the current security measures appear to have discouraged them.

We inch ever closer to owning the Village Hall car park. All of the paperwork has been signed and is with the solicitor. We have also agreed a contract for the urgently needed repairs to the sewers. To minimise disruption to users of the hall excavation work will start just before half term but will carefully avoid causing any access issues. The excavation outside the main entrance will take place during half term when use of the hall is minimal.

Our litter pick on 8th September was very sparsely attended. Well done to Sharon for leading. We were missing one of our stalwarts due to a bereavement. You are in our thoughts. Love and best wishes to you at a difficult time.



Sadly, another passing to report. David Iliffe, long time Parish Councillor, passed away on 25th July. David's knowledge and patience (and sense of humour) were a huge help to me when I became Parish Clerk. David was made our first Freeman of the Parish on 8th August 2017 for his outstanding service to the parish. David moved to Stroud for family reasons but always retained his love of Swindon Parish. Our thoughts are with David's family and many friends.

The Parish Council has received an appeal on behalf of elderly residents to organise/facilitate the provision of handyman services. Even tasks as apparently simple as changing a light bulb can be problematic for people with limited mobility. The Parish Council discussed the matter. Whilst we would love to help we think it would be difficult to maintain some kind of register. After all, we could be responsible for introducing individuals who are unknown to us into the homes of vulnerable people. If anyone has an idea as to how such a scheme might be operated safely let us know. We would also encourage tradesmen who may be able to help to advertise their services in the Village News. In the absence of any formal scheme the Parish Councillors would generally be happy to assist individuals if necessary.

The police were present at the Village Hall on the 14th September security marking bikes and adding them to the bike register. Over 20 bikes were processed. If a stolen bike is recovered, its entry on the bike register allows it to be reunited with its owner. The temper-proof security markings applied to the machine may also deter casual thieves. The police provide this service regularly so there will be other opportunities if you missed this one and your bike isn't stolen in the interim!







And Sarah and I have to say it was good to see you all. The white wine was reasonably cool and the red wasn't. However, I could not possibly tell you all the things that were discussed or writs could ensue. So this will be quite a short report.

So, what do we have coming up? Well, in October we have John Dixon along to tell us about 'Boat Building in Tewkesbury'. I do know that John worked on the boats that plied their trade on the Severn in days of yore. I do believe that he was also Mayor of Tewkesbury. So we have a pretty authoritative speaker. I also seem to remember that Tewkesbury built small fast craft for the services in the Second World War – possibly Air Sea rescue craft and such like. However, this is possibly wrong so do not put money on this fact in the pub quiz. If you really want to know what happened come along on 16th October and find out.

In the week I that I write this report I have been checking out a walk for the group I walk with. It is from Swindon Village to Stoke Orchard and back. Some of you may remember the excellent talk we had on the part RAF Stoke Orchard played in the war training army glider pilots and much more. Many of these pilots then went on to take part in the attempt to capture a bridge at Arnhem and the crossing of the Rhine. At the end of the talk we were told that Stoke Orchard's playground now had a climbing frame in the form of one of the gliders that Army pilots learned to fly. So, since I was there, I went for a look and I was most impressed that there was indeed just such an excellent memorial to the local airfield and those who



served there that could serve to pass the tale on to younger generations. And then I discovered that just behind the playground is a small store with rather a good coffee bar. So now I am pleased to recommend both the coffee bar and the playground. And if you do visit, I would also suggest a visit to the Church which has the remnants of some very old wall paintings with good explanations in a book. The church and the paintings are dedicated to St James and as a result there are many marks made by pilgrims as indeed we have on the side to the entrance porch of our own church. There are also the graves of four who died while serving at the airfield.

Swindon Village and Guy Ritchie's new film...

`The Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare' tells the story of WWII daring exploits in Operation POSTMASTER and, particularly, Major Gustavus March Phillips (a main inspiration for Ian Fleming's *James Bond*). The action takes place in September 1942 in West Africa and it is a complete success—paving the way for subsequent elite special forces, including the SAS.

82 years later, a band of volunteers are tackling a jungle of undergrowth and clearing a big dead holly tree when they reveal the largest memorial in St Lawrence's Churchyard, Swindon Village. This striking memorial is that of Charles March Phillipps, 7th Lord of Garendon, Leicestershire, and his descendants. Charles had moved to a house called Vallombrosa (now *Homespring House*, Pittville Circus Road) in 1859. The house is mentioned in Milton's *Paradise Lost*.

Thereafter, Gus became highly decorated and took part in other daring operations until he was sadly killed during Operation AQUATINT - a mission on what would become Omaha Beach. The body of Gustavus March Phillipps, founder of 62 Commando, was discovered and then buried there in France. A German machine gun post having been set up to prevent anyone attending his funeral!

Thanks to a merry bunch of village volunteers, the churchyard is now looking delightful once more; many old monuments have been revealed again; and it's a lovely peaceful place for quiet contemplation. If you're lucky enough to visit, take a look at this impressive monument. Perhaps you'll uncover more links between this family and our beautiful churchyard - or yet more fascinating history worthy of Hollywood....

Hello Gardeners,

I can't believe it's now Autumn. Autumn for me is a time to admire the last few flowers, but also think about moving plants around for next year.

In this article, for a change from the norm, I'm going to cover what I've done in our garden in the past month, in the hope that it helps you if anything is relatable!

It's definitely a nicer problem to have when certain plants, Geraniums for us, get too big for the space they're in. As such I've now moved two large Geraniums from our back garden to the front, as we're really keen to add more height to our back garden, something Geraniums don't add, but they have been great for colour, ground cover and attracting the bees. The space released will likely be occupied by taller evergreens.

After months of thought, we're also planting our two Acer Trees into the ground. They're currently in large pots and doing well, but as I mentioned earlier, we're keen to add height interest to our garden and Acers are a great way to achieve that. Both of them have the potential to reach 2-3m high and look amazing too. Our back garden is very shady, but Acers actually like these conditions, so we're confident they'll do well.



Lastly and possibly most importantly, I'm intending to move around my raised beds I use for Vegetables to make space for a small Greenhouse in the sunniest part of my Garden. This year's lack of sun & heat in the summer has really made for poor results with plants such as Tomatoes & Courgettes out in the open and my Dad made me rather jealous with his delicious Cucumbers from his Greenhouse, so I'd like to try them next year too!

Lots to keep me busy this Autumn, I hope you've enjoyed reading this differing format this month.
