


A slightly different editorial from me this month as I combine two of my 'hats'!


Swindon Parish and Community Website: https://swindonparish.org.uk I don't normally read what I write; that's your job. However, I did revisit last month's article. A bit moany wasn't it? People dropping litter, parking inappropriately, grumbling at the Parish Council. Of course I know it's not you lot; it's "incomers". We are blessed with a good school so the catchment area probably extends to the fringes of Wolverhampton by now. And I'm sure people drive from Devon to walk their dogs in our beautiful park (or dump their old mattresses). This month I'm going to focus on the positives before I lose all of my readership, but if you are an "incomer" remember that the Village News is available online. Even if you are in Wolverhampton or Devon you can still read what I think of you.

As part of the devolution debate (replacing the County and Borough Councils with a single authority) there was talk of postponing the County Council elections this year. However, the decision was taken to proceed. We have one County Councillor. The list of candidates is on our website. The poll will take place on 1st May (and may be history when you read this). Elections happen on four year cycles. The next parish council elections will take place in 2026. Make a note in your diaries.

The Elms Park outline planning application came up for consultation again. The Swindon Farm development currently in progress is part of Elms Park. It was approved even though the outline application for the full site is still under consideration. A bit odd don't you think?

One of our eagle eyed Parish Councillors has spotted that a company called Terra will be seeking planning consent for a parcel of land to the south east of Brockhampton. The land is mostly in Swindon Parish but with a part in Bishops Cleeve Parish. One to watch.





The Parish Councillors "enjoyed" an evening course on the Code of Conduct. The deputy monitoring officer of the Borough Council is delivering the same message to each of the five Cheltenham parishes. Apparently some members of the other Councils sat looking glum, constantly checking their social media and periodically mumbling "Why do I have to be here?" Not our lot. They asked questions. They take their responsibilities seriously but manage a cup of tea and a laugh along the way.



Ah, the closure of Manor Road. It is difficult to keep up with this! I was advised that Manor Road was to be closed for a day on 17th March. Then someone mentioned to me that they had heard the road would be closed until July. "Don't be ridiculous" said I. "I have the notice; one day only." I was then shocked to receive a notice saying that it would be closed northbound from 17th March through 8th July. Next it was to be closed northbound from 24th March through 8th July. The latest is that the closure is postponed to a date to be notified. So, as I write it is not closed yet (although the traffic lights have failed again!). More turmoil is coming. Brace for impact!

Swindon Lane hasn't been closed for a while. That will be put right overnight on 12th May to 13th May for work on the level crossing. Another sleepless night for yours truly.

The average Band D precept charged by local precepting bodies (including parish and town councils) for 2025/26 will be £92.22, an increase of £6.32 or 7.4% in 2025/26. Ours will be £18.98, an increase of 5.3%. The total amount that a band D household pays in our parish equates to 5p a day. Take it out of the kids' pocket money. They won't even notice.

Our financial year ended on 31st March and I am now busy preparing accounts and enduring audits. I hope your thoughts are with me at this difficult time!

I had a meeting with JR (not her real name but close!) regarding the Quat Goose Lane bus shelter. JR (who is lovely) extended our conversation to everything she wanted fixed in Swindon Village and mistakenly thought that I could achieve this. As a result I reported (via Fix My Street) a problem manhole cover. Well, it has been fixed! I nearly fell off my chair when I heard.



I was also able to confirm that the bus timetables displayed are current (though sadly the times at which the buses arrive seem to bear no correlation). However, I note that Stagecoach is cutting huge numbers of routes in the county. Luckily the H service is only listed as having "minor changes" from 27th November. Perhaps it will change to running on time?

Your paper copy of the Village News may have been late last month. It is important that people take personal responsibility, so I will name and shame. It was down to me. Hero status was fleeting. Sorry team.

RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE

On Thursday 8th May, there will celebrations all across Europe to mark the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe – the day the Second World War ended in Europe. Events are planned all over the country as people from all walks of life celebrate the freedom gained after Nazi Germany formally surrendered to Allied forces. VE Day gradually brought an end to nearly six years of suffering, rationing and deprivation. Feelings of joy and relief were tempered by memories of the hundreds of thousands who had died, or were still missing, and concern for those still at war. WW2 did not end until August 1945 when Japan surrendered.

More than 250,000 Allied Prisoners of War were liberated in Europe, and as the Allies swept through Europe, they uncovered the full horror of the network of concentration and forced labour camps and other locations. Six million Jewish people and hundreds of thousands of others had been murdered.

Yet after years of uncertainty and sacrifice, the people of Europe could face the new challenges of reconstruction and peace. The Second World War generation changed the course of history and commenced the rebuilding of an exhausted country in the post war years.

In the Church this month, we celebrate Ascension, forty days after Easter Sunday. Christians believe that Jesus spent time with his disciples and told them that God would send the Holy Spirit to them, once he had returned to heaven. In those forty days after Easter, the horror of the crucifixion and the joy of Christ's resurrection, the disciples wanted some stability. They were exhausted from fear of the Roman authorities and the events of Easter.



Jesus assured them that they would be empowered to go out and build the Church and prepared them for the next phase of their journey. They were being set off to re-build a new thing.

In our world, in all its fragility and brokenness, the greed and selfishness, we might reflect on the can-do attitude of the post-war generation. However, as we commemorate VE80, we give thanks to all those who made the ultimate sacrifice that we might live full lives. At 9:30pm on 8th May, there will be beacons lit all over the UK to spread the light of peace. Perhaps we too can light a candle and shine it in our windows to pass on the message of peace and courage in gratitude to those who gave up so much.





New service times at St. Lawrence

We have moved in to our new pattern of Sunday services at St. Lawrence's Church.

A Eucharistic service (Holy Communion) will take place every Sunday morning at the new time of 9.30am. On the first Sunday of the month this will be a more informal and relaxed style, suitable for those little people who don't always sit still and quiet!

Evensong will only be held on the first and third Sundays of each month, at the earlier time of 5pm.

When there is a 5th Sunday in a month, Holy Communion will be held at 10am and will alternate between St. Lawrence's and St. Mary Magdalene's in Elmstone Hardwicke where Revd. Jacqueline is also the Vicar.

Everyone is welcome at all services; if you don't want to take Communion you will still be welcome at the altar to receive a blessing.

We have tea/coffee/squash and biscuits after the morning services.



Our March talk was by John Parker, CEO of the Arboricultural Association. If anyone does not know, arboriculture is planting and maintenance of trees. So, not unsurprisingly, John's talk was on – Trees – and also not unsurprisingly it was first rate. First, I must thank our bookings secretary for his great prescience in booking such a talk to take place just two days before the announcement if a new national forest to be located in the West of England including Gloucestershire. How do I do it? In fact the area of new planting will mostly be between Gloucester and Bristol and will take in land that has limited agricultural use and even include planting in built up area.

The talk covered many things. First was the fact that if you have trees nearby it generates an increase in house prices. And if you plant them in a town it is very good for businesses such as cafes and restaurants.

Next great fact – Britain has more ancient trees than the whole of the rest of Europe combined. In many local churchyards there is a yew tree that can be a thousand years old. In fact I had read somewhere that the ancient yew may well have been the church before anyone got around to building an edifice with a roof because people would congregate for their worship in the shelter of an old(ish) yew to keep the rain of.

But John also had a number of warnings. We all know of Dutch elm disease, ash dieback and the problems besetting oaks. These were all caused by the importation of cheap trees without sufficient care being taken to make sure that they were disease free. Indeed, many problems have been caused even by people bringing samples and cuttings back from their holidays in their luggage. Such random pieces of greenery can cause problems that rapidly escalate. So, the message is – don't.



Finally, if you are thinking of planting a tree, do bear in mind climate change and plant something that is doing well in Barcelona right now. When your new tree is forty and thriving, our climate will be more like that of the Mediterranean and your tree will be flourishing.

Anyway, a great talk and I know he has other more specific talks up his sleeve so we may well get him back again.

In May, Nicola Potter, who is very local will tell us about metal detecting and will bring some artefacts found locally.

In June our garden visit will be to Brockworth Court which features in the Gloucestershire Open Gardens List. It will be on the evening of Tuesday 17th June with an entry fee of £6 in cash. We will arrange lifts where possible and may be able to take some non-members. So let me know early if you are interested.


PLEASE

Fruit and vegetables in season during May are...

Fruit: Rhubarb, Strawberries

Vegetables: Artichoke, Asparagus, Aubergine, Beetroot, Chicory, Chillies, Elderflowers, Lettuce, Marrow, New Potatoes, Peas, Peppers, Radishes, Rocket, Samphire, Sorrel, Spinach, Spring Greens, Spring Onions, Watercress

So folks, we have enjoyed soup, main meal and now for the dessert...

Rhubarb cake..

9x9 Square baking tin , or round tin, lined Oven temp... 180°c , 350f , gas 4

Ingredients

1tsp lemon juice60ml milk70g yogurt250g plain flour2tsp baking powder1tsp salt

250g rhubarb thinly sliced 60g butter 200g sugar 1 large egg 1/2 tsp Vanilla extract





Cook with Dawn

Method

- 1. In a small bowl, stir lemon juice, milk and yogurt together, set aside
- 2. In a bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder and salt, set aside
- 3. Place rhubarb in a small bowl and sprinkle over 1tbs of the flour. set aside
- 4. In another bowl, cream the butter and sugar together
- 5. Add the egg and vanilla extract to the butter and sugar, beat together
- 6. Add half the flour to the egg mixture and beat again
- 7. Now pour in the milk, yogurt and lemon juice and stir
- 8. Then add the rest of the flour and mix lightly, don't over mix
- 9. Gently fold in the rhubarb
- 10. Pour the mixture into the baking tin
- 11. Sprinkle a little sugar over the top
- 12. Bake for 40-45 mins

Cake is cooked when tested, insert a skewer into the cake - if it comes out clean, the cake is ready.

This lovely cake can be enjoyed hot with your favourite topping, custard or ice-cream or eaten cold just as an afternoon tea cake... enjoy...

Go grow with Dale

Hello Gardeners, it's Mid Spring already and there's been lots of garden changes and unexpected heat for this time of year!

This month, I wanted to talk about self seeders, an idea prompted by the abundance of forget me nots in our garden, which are a beautiful spring staple that are not just in our flowerbeds purposely, but in the cracks between our road and driveway. Much nicer to look at than weeds! Obviously this means they're quite prolific, but they can be kept under control if you prune them when their seed pods start to appear in late Spring/early Summer.

Another really popular self seeder is Verbena bonariensis, which is tall and purple and loved by all pollinators. We picked ours up last year from Stoke Orchard Farm Shop, of all places, we're yet to see where they've self seeded to, but they're generally known for doing it in close proximity to the parent plants.

Our second most prolific self seeder is alchemilla mollis (aka Lady's Mantle) which is a great ground cover plant, that looks beautiful after some rain as its leaves don't absorb any water and give a beading effect. Like Verbena though, they're fairly easy to control as they generally seed very close by.

Lastly, almost surprisingly, is Stipa tenuissima (aka Mexican feather Grass/Ponytail). I didn't even know until a year after buying this grass, that it self propagates. It grows to around 60cm tall, which makes it great for borders and really makes our Purple Echinacea's in the border next to it, pop even more.

Hopefully some of the above plants are of use to you and can help you grow an even more populated garden for very little money.
