

Have a lovely summer and enjoy!





On the 29th May 2025 the Borough Council planning committee reached a momentous decision. The committee unanimously approved the outline planning application for Elms Park, giving the green light to the construction of 4,115 homes together with a senior school, two primary schools, retail and business areas, sports, transport and care facilities.

The map below shows the context of the Elms Park (single cross hatching) and Home Farm (double cross hatching) developments. Elms Park spans Swindon Parish, Cheltenham and Uckington Parish, Tewkesbury. The Home Farm development (if it goes ahead) will be entirely within Swindon Parish.





The graphic shows the Elms Park development that will straddle the boundary of Swindon and Uckington parishes. Also shown is the smaller, prospective Home Farm development.

The Joint Core Strategy (JCS) identified key areas for development in the Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury areas, including the North West Strategic Allocation that will become Elms Park. The JCS was produced to cover a twenty year period from 2011 to 2031. It was contentious and did not get approved until 2017. Already its successor is under development.

Consent for Elms Park has been granted subject to over 50 planning conditions. Here are two of the key ones.

l No more than 1,306 homes shall be occupied prior to work commencing on making M5 Junction 10 four way

l No more than 3,327 homes shall be occupied prior to work being completed on making M5 Junction 10 four way



On 4th June 2025 it was announced that consent had been given for the M5 Junction 10 works. However, there is still a shortfall in the finances. At the time of writing the developers are being asked to make up the deficit. The arguments continue.

As part of this overall scheme it is intended to improve the Coombe Hill junction between the A38 and the A4019. Note that it is anticipated that the A4019 will be closed completely for a period of 16 weeks from early 2026. I think I'll buy a helicopter to get about! 5



The Elms Park development has been argued about for over 10 years and will take many years to complete. It is a sobering thought that we were a lot younger when this was first debated and, for many of us, it will not be completed in our lifetimes.

From mega developments to toaster recycling. Last month I told you about my quandary regarding the disposal of our old toaster. A very kind reader pointed out to me this information on the Borough Council website. "Household batteries, small electrical appliances, textiles and shoes should be put in separate tied carrier bags and put inside one of your green recycling boxes with the lid closed". I love to hear from you; writing in a vacuum can be uncomfortable!

A Community Governance Review is underway to consider whether new parishes should be created in Cheltenham and/or existing boundaries adjusted. Should Swindon Parish Council seek to expand to encompass other areas? Should we contract so that we only represent Swindon Village? Should we simply stay as we are? What do you think? It is possible to express your views online or obtain a paper copy of the survey from the Borough Council offices.

Last time I grumbled about electric scooters being left randomly. I came across another fine example of parking. On the scooter is an identifier and a web link via which you can report issues. The web link is wrong. It should be report.voi.com. If you find examples of rubbish parking or inconsiderate riding please report them.


The Parish Council supported the Village Fair. The fair is another example of the hard work Jana puts in for the community. I hope you supported it too and had a great day.

# RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE

After enjoying some beautifully warm weather at the beginning of May, we might be hoping for some more summer weather during the school holidays. I have memories of holidays where I grew up in Devon involving a uniform of waterproof coat, wellies and t-shirts!

When we take a break, our behaviour becomes more relaxed. Weather permitting, people sit in parks picnicking over lunch breaks, and we take coffee outside, sit at pavement cafes instead of huddling indoors. Summer becomes a time for reconnecting with the natural light, the greater opportunities for communal living afforded by being able to sit out of doors for longer, watching children playing and people talking outside instead of sitting in enclosed spaces. There is a sense of a general relaxing into the present, a willingness to linger over meals or encounters, savouring the moment, allowing the time to flow by. Summer takes us into holiday time, when in families the rhythms of work change, children and adults may spend more time together. Breaks can take us into different environments, give opportunities for exploration and expansion of horizons.

Whether we are spending the summer in the UK or travelling abroad, the change of season reminds us to take some time to just 'be', to savour what we have and to pause. We live in a divided and troubled world which can seem a bit bleak and unsettling.

In May we were visited by Nicola Potter who runs a local metal detecting group. She has been metal detecting for four years but has amassed a remarkable range of finds over that time. We were treated to pictures of many of them ranging from pre Roman items to Victorian bits and bobs. Nicola has a pretty sophisticated detector which cost in the region of two thousand pounds. It can tell, within limits, what sort of metal it is looking at and in general if the machine believes it is looking at iron it is left in place. It is all the other metals that merit digging. And just about all the finds are from the first few inches of top soil; rarely more than a foot deep.

We saw pictures of coins well over two thousand years old, of farming bits and pieces, of costume ware and bits of weaponry. One of my favourites was a couple of coins bent into a wave shape which were apparently love tokens. Both were found close to each other just a few inches below the surface of a field. What did that signify; a lovers tiff or merely carelessness?

It was also interesting to hear how careful the group were to record finds, declare them to the appropriate authorities if they might have real historic significance. Also how they made sure that a proper contract was drawn up between themselves and the landowner before they started detecting work. Indeed we had three visitors at the meeting who I know well from the Norton area. One, is a farmer who has had his land surveyed by Nicola, and the others a couple who I are just about to embark on a similar survey. I wait with interest to see what turns up.

So on to the next three months. Well, in July we have Sue Webb, who works with the police. She is going to tell us about 'Policing in Rural Gloucestershire'. We may even get a mention because I know that for many years in the 1800s the Chief Constable of Cheltenham lived in the village.



Then in August it is the infamous garden party. Luke warm wine and a rain shower. Not to be missed. This is a member's only event so join now.

On to September and our own John Heathcott is going to give us a talk on 'The History of the Cotswolds'. John has been a long time Cotswold Warden and has devoted much time and energy to maintain the region from dry stone walling to guiding around the area. Our last few town and village visits led by John have all been both pleasing and informative. I can strongly recommend this talk and, of course, visitors will be very welcome for £3.

Here is a fun Blueberry Muffin recipe for the children to have a bash at...

Ingredients150g/5.5oz blueberries, washed and dried carefully250g/8oz self raising flour140g/5oz caster sugar1 tsp bicarbonate of soda85ml vegetable oil2 eggs200ml semi-skimmed milk12 hole muffin tin1tsp vanilla extract12 paper muffin cases



# Cook with Dawn

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°c/180°c fan/gas 6.
- 2. Place paper cases into the muffin tin
- 3. In a bowl, mix the dry ingredients together, flour, sugar and bicarbonate of soda. Set aside.
- 4. Pour the oil into a measuring jug.
- 5. In a separate small bowl, beat the eggs then add them to the oil, along with the milk and vanilla extract, stir together.
- 6. Pour the wet ingredients onto the bowl of dry ingredients and stir until combined.
- 7. Gently fold in the blueberries.
- 8. Spoon the mixture, evenly, into the paper muffin cases.
- 9. Bake for 15-18 minutes until risen and golden.

Cool on a wire rack...

Serve warm and eat straight away, or.. Store in an airtight container for 2-3 days. Can be frozen for one month. Defrost fully before eating...

Blueberry Muffins... a tasty treat on a summers afternoon.

# Go grow with Dale

Hello Gardeners, it's now July and this time of year is bountiful.

We've harvested some of our 'grow your own' vegetables, with second early potatoes. As briefly mentioned before, this was my first year of doing potatoes in bags, rather than our raised bed. We got a good harvest but it was hindered by using up some of our heavy clay soil. These potatoes needed mounding up, and there was an obvious increase in the number at the top of the bags where I used free draining fresh compost to mound up. So for my main crop planting, this week, I will be sure to use loose, free draining soil throughout, in the hopes of a bumper crop.

We also had our first successes from our greenhouse with "come again" salad leaves, a mixed salad grown from seed, and pea shoots. These made for some tasty and fresh home made salads. Both of these can be harvested 2/3 times but do require succession sewing for salad all through the summer. We can't wait to add our own tomatoes and cucumbers later on in the summer.

Summer isn't all about vegetables though, my wife has also been loving her cut flowers. Our fragrant sweet peas have done particularly well in this weather. We have had a fresh posy in the house every week and given away many more on our sharing wall. Cutting really helps these flowers to keep flowering and once they go to seed they are easy to collect ready for next year. The dahlias have also started blooming, but remember they are a favourite slug food, so be sure to use beer traps near them to protect your blooms.
