

After 10 or more years of planning activity and arguments residents are now moving into the Regents Village development, also known as Swindon Farm or Elms Park phase 1. Regardless of how we got to this point it is the future that is important. Welcome to your new homes and our Swindon Parish community. We are trying to make sure you get information that will be useful as you settle into your new homes. We hope you will take an interest in what goes on in the area, including the work of the Parish Council. Perhaps even join us?



It was well known and unavoidable that there would be a big increase in traffic in the area as a result of the extended closure of the A435 past the racecourse, on road works. The Parish Council were active in trying to mitigate the effects on local residents and achieved an agreement that other roadworks in our area would be postponed unless they were required to address an emergency. Imagine our surprise when contractors set up works which would cause major disruption in the Kingsditch area.

Our councillors intervened, the contractors were told to withdraw and National Grid were issued with a fixed penalty notice.

Questions have been asked about access to the defibrillator at the village hall. It is owned by the Parish Council. It is registered on the National Defibrillator Network (thecircuit.uk). This service is owned by the British Heart Foundation and registration is recommended by the South Western Ambulance Service. The defibrillator is checked monthly. Its registration also means that I am notified of any technical issues with the defibrillator requiring it to be recalled, modified or updated. I have just looked at a recall for our type of machine but the serial number indicates that we are not affected.

If an emergency occurs, recommended practice is for someone to ring 999. They will be directed to an appropriate defibrillator by the emergency services and provided with the code to unlock it. Members of the public do not need to search for a defibrillator themselves.

We continue to suffer graffiti issues from the same perpetrator. Goodness knows what they get out of it but it makes work for a lot of people who have better things to do with their time. We have ordered some posters from Crimestoppers to encourage people to keep their eyes open and report suspicious activity.

A consultation is underway on the introduction of 20mph speed limits. Probably not appropriate for the major routes through the area but for side roads/estate roads all the evidence points to this being beneficial. Get in touch with your views.

He has been a true friend to our area and has gone in to bat on our behalf, solving problems, finding funding and providing advice. Speaking of which, our application for a grant to meet the cost of the gates to the Village Hall car park was approved. Bernard suggested we apply and supported our bid.

Sadly I was away for both the Village Fair and the annual cake sale at the church (also the plant sale, but that is of less interest to me!). I know the Fair was a success and I trust that the cake and plant sale also did well. Thanks and congratulations to the organisers. It's great to have positive initiatives on our patch.

Read with Me

As demand for our service grows, Read With Me is looking for funding and volunteers. Read With Me provides volunteers to hear children read in Gloucestershire's schools.

Set up in 2020 to meet the crisis in children's literacy, we are now a charity with 400 volunteers in over 100 Gloucestershire schools.

Read With Me's one-to-one reading sessions help children learn to read well which in turn improves their literacy and builds their confidence. These fundamental skills position a child in the 'driving seat' of their own future, opening up the opportunity to break the cycle of poverty and deprivation and to fulfil their potential. Children who don't learn to read, struggle with the school curriculum, employment and self-sufficiency; and are disproportionately represented in the prison population.

Read With Me also runs the Not-So-Secret Book Clubs every holiday, providing storytelling and creative opportunities, treasure hunts, crafts and, of course, free preloved books. In particular, children in areas of greatest deprivation and those arriving in Gloucester with English as a second language, may not have any books at home.

Read With Me runs on a shoestring. In addition to operational expenditure, it costs £100 to check and train each volunteer and £70 a year thereafter to maintain their role.

Locally, Read With Me is partnered with Swindon Village Primary School and as such we are seeking £580 towards the costs of maintaining the role of 4 existing volunteers and onboarding 3 new volunteers.


Equipping the youngest residents in the community is key for each child and essential to the social fabric of Gloucestershire.

RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE

I wonder if you ever get that "back to school feeling" at the beginning of September? No matter how old we are, somehow the end of August marks the end of a season where the pace has perhaps slowed down a bit as people take a break and have some time to recharge their batteries.

The beginning of September is always a time when the Church year gets a little boost and we look forward to the events which herald a new period. The back-to-school energy helps to focus on what needs prioritising. At St. Lawrence, we are thinking about stewardship and how we might use our talents and time to help the Church, both as a building, but also as a body of people. The Churchyard Crew are an excellent example of stewards.





Our July meeting gave us the lowdown on early policing in Gloucestershire. In fact Gloucestershire was the first county to have a fully authorised Constabulary up and running. I think it was Worcestershire that was the first authorised but Gloucestershire was approved the next day and had a Chief Constable in place the day after. However, rather than go into detail of subsequent policing I will instead quote an extract which not only involves that Chief Constable but gives an interesting picture of Swindon Village a hundred and seventy years ago.

This extract is from 'Diary of a Cotswold Parson, 1783-1854' by the Reverend F E Witts:

18th March 1852

I arrived at the Police Station in Cheltenham where I found the Chief Constable's (Lefroy) open carriage waiting to convey me to his house at Swindon. Drove thither by the back roads passing Maud's Elm. All very much altered in the lapse of years by the increase of building in the suburbs, and the line of the railway. The village of Swindon with its Manor House, its ancient church restored, its parsonage, and two or three lesser residences the property of Mr Surman, in one of which the Chief Constable resides, is a pretty rural hamlet embosomed in trees. Lefroy was fortunate in selecting this house on his marriage as it is within half an hour's walk, or ten minutes drive of his constabulary office. It is near the church. The wealthiest neighbour is Mr Surman, one of the legatees of the miser banker of Gloucester, Jemmy Wood. He is unmarried but has changed his name from Goodlake, and has a sister living with him, a pleasing person. It is strange how women accommodate themselves to a change of circumstances better than men. Miss Goodlake looks the lady, Mr Surman does not look the gentleman.

He was a clerk to his kinsman the banker, and now possesses at Swindon a good estate with a handsome and large house, for the most part newly built, situate in very enjoyable pleasure grounds, bordered at a distance by the Bristol and Birmingham Railway, and commanding beautiful views of the surrounding hills. In these grounds I walked with Lefroy, who introduced me to Mr Surman, whom we found playing billiards with Mr Agg in an iron billiards room in the grounds. Mr and Mrs Agg were staying with the Lefroys. They have let their place, Hewletts, and are going for a twelvemonth to sea bathing places. At half past six Lefroy's small dining room contained a large party including Lady Steel whose husband finds Cheltenham more pleasant as a residence than Mickleton Manor. Cards and music in the evening'.

Well, maybe things have changed a little, but the Village Society garden party (still to take place as I type this) should be much the same as the soiree described above. Mr Surman's house was Swindon Hall.

So on to the next three months. In September our own John Heathcott is going to give us a talk on 'The History of the Cotswolds'. John has been a long time Cotswold Warden and has devoted much time and energy to maintain the region from dry stone walling to guiding around the area. Our last few town and village visits led by John have all been both pleasing and informative. I can strongly recommend this talk and, of course, visitors will be very welcome for £3. In October David Aldred will tell us about 'Hailes Abbey and the mystery of the Holy Blood'. Then in November we have 'Cheltenham's Iconic Buildings' by David Elder.

Our Scout section are now urgently looking for someone to volunteer on Monday evenings, 7.15pm to 8.30pm in the Village Hall to help run the sessions.



Fruit and vegetables in season ... September...

As autumn slowly approaches and the days are getting shorter, here is a little treat for you, not one but two quick recipes...





Cook with Dawn

Chicken Quesadillas

Ingredients. Serves 4-6

Cooking spray

1/2 red onion, finally diced

1 red pepper, deseeded and diced

2 tortilla wraps

2 cooked chicken breast, shredded

90g cheddar cheese, grated (or more)

To serve

Finally chopped tomatoes mixed salad leaves and fat free yogurt

For spicy quesadilla add 1/2 tsp each cumin and chilli power when onions are cooking.

Method

- 1. Heat a frying pan, spray with cooking spray, cook the onions, peppers and spices (if using) until soft, set aside.
- 2. Add a tortilla to the pan and spoon half the veg along one half of the wrap, then the chicken and finally half the cheese.
- 3. Fold the wrap over and cook for a few minutes, flip over and cook a couple minutes more, slide onto a plate, keep warm.
- 4. Repeat process with second wrap.
- 5. Slice each quesadilla in 1/2 or 1/3 triangles, serve with the chopped tomatoes and yogurt.

<u>Autumn fruit salad in ginger syrup</u>

Ingredients

3 level tbsp sweeter granules

2.5 cm piece of ginger peeled and finally sliced

Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon

8 small or 4 large ripe plums, quartered or halved

1 large ripe pear, quartered, cored and sliced length wise

150g blackberries, washed and dried

150g black grapes, washed and halved

To serve

Fat free greek yogurt sprinkled with cinnamon

Method

- 1. Put the sweetner, ginger, lemon zest and 600ml water into a saucpan, slowly bring to the boil, stirring to dissolve sweetner.
- 2. Simmer for 4 minutes, then increase heat to high and boil rapidly for 3-4 minutes until reduced by half.
- 3. Stir in the lemon juice, then strain into a bowl, discard ginger and zest.
- 4. Arrange fruit in a serving bowl, pour over syrup, gently stir to coat all the fruit.
- 5. Cover and chill for one hour.
- 6. Serve with the yogurt.

Colouring fun



Go grow with Dale

Hello Gardeners, welcome back after a very dry summer. It seems us gardeners have to increasingly adapt to the changes in weather in recent years, so I thought I'd talk this month about the plants that have thrived in our garden.

Despite very much being a cottage style plant, our creeping Hydrangeas have done really well, a few scorched leaves, but a lot of new growth, even from a baby that's just one year old. Most people I mention this plant to, don't seem to know it exists, but it's a beautiful plant and comes in a variety of coloured flowers, ours being white.

Out of the front of our house, we have a few small raised beds for flowers and this year it's very much been adored by the bees, due to the vigorous growth of two Catmint plants (Nepeta cataria), which despite lack of water, seem to have got a lot bushier and more flowers than ever before, both originally from the Webbs sale area in Autumn last year.

It might come at no surprise to most, but shrubs tend to particularly thrive when abused by the weather. Both our Red Robin Photinias and Choisya have done amazing, with zero watering this year, though they are 3-4 years old now. We've been tying down branches of our Photinias to assist them in becoming wider and more bushy, since they are over 2.2 meters tall now and they seem to have reacted very positively. So much so that we now have a male and female blackbird living within, who often wander out to find worms after I've been digging!

Obviously, but rather strangely, there have also been casualties of rather hardy plants this year too. Honeysuckle being one of them, just two years old, meant to be almost ivy hardy, but couldn't cope with the dryness. We've also lost a few ferns that got way too scorched and in hindsight, should've been in a different position (more shady).

Always learning year to year, but I'm sure the lessons will give my garden long term benefits!






